Alberta Environment and Parks (AEP) representatives, Megan Watters and Dave Hervieux will be in attendance to provide Council with information regarding the Little Smoky Caribou Rearing facility.

The intent of the rearing facility is to provide a predator-free environment for increasing the survival of caribou adults and calves. At the time of receiving the presentation request form, May 16, 2019 Alberta Environment and Parks (AEP) was in the design and survey phase of the project. AEP had intended to make the presentation to Council May 21st, however with the election and the change in Alberta Government, the presenters asked to postpone their presentation. The second attempt to schedule the meeting was for June 17th. Council was making a decision at the May 27th Meeting to cancel or affirm the June 17th Committee of the Whole Meeting. With the possibility of the June 17th meeting being cancelled, AEP made other arrangements and were unable to attend.

Council will be provided with the current to-date information on the status of the rearing facility.

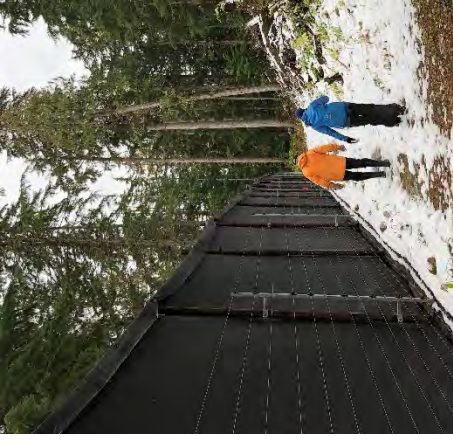

What is a Rearing Facility?

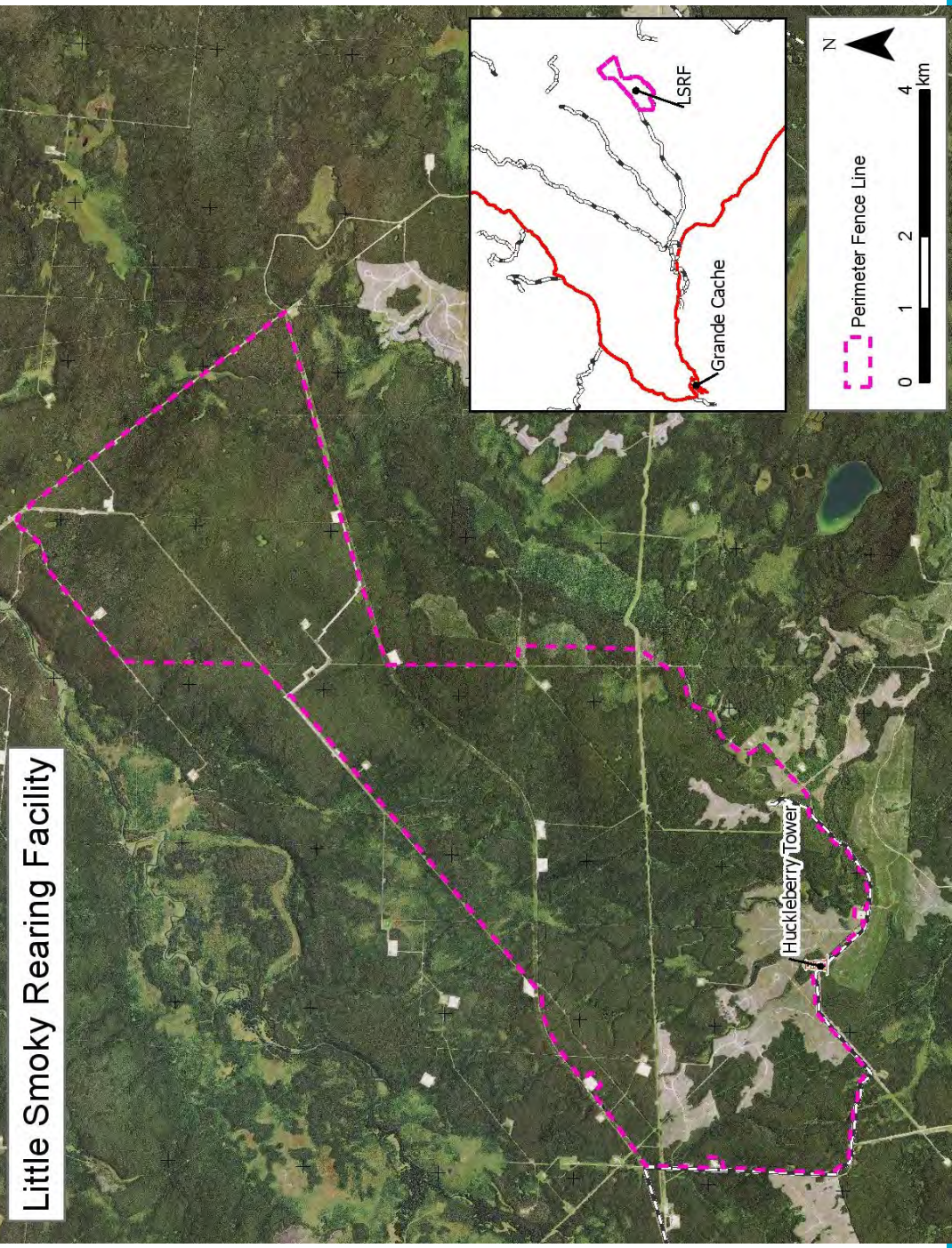
- Large area of natural habitat surrounded by a predator-proof fence
- Allows caribou to live year-round in a predator free environment:
 - increase calf and adult caribou survival
 - boost the wild population



Intent of the Little Smoky Rearing Facility

- Enable the persistence of the Little Smoky caribou herd while habitat restoration, integrated land management planning, and other management actions are used
- Help the GOA meet the federal expectations of maintaining self-sustaining caribou populations (*Species at Risk Act*)
- Serve as a pilot to help us learn about rearing facilities as a recovery tool

Little Smoky Rearing Facility



The Big Fence

- 8 ft tall game fence with woven wire and steel posts
- Electric high tensile wires on external outrigger
- Buried or pinned chain-link apron
- Locked gate

Part of the South Grow Regional Initiative and has created a “One-Dig” policy to include fiber infrastructure.

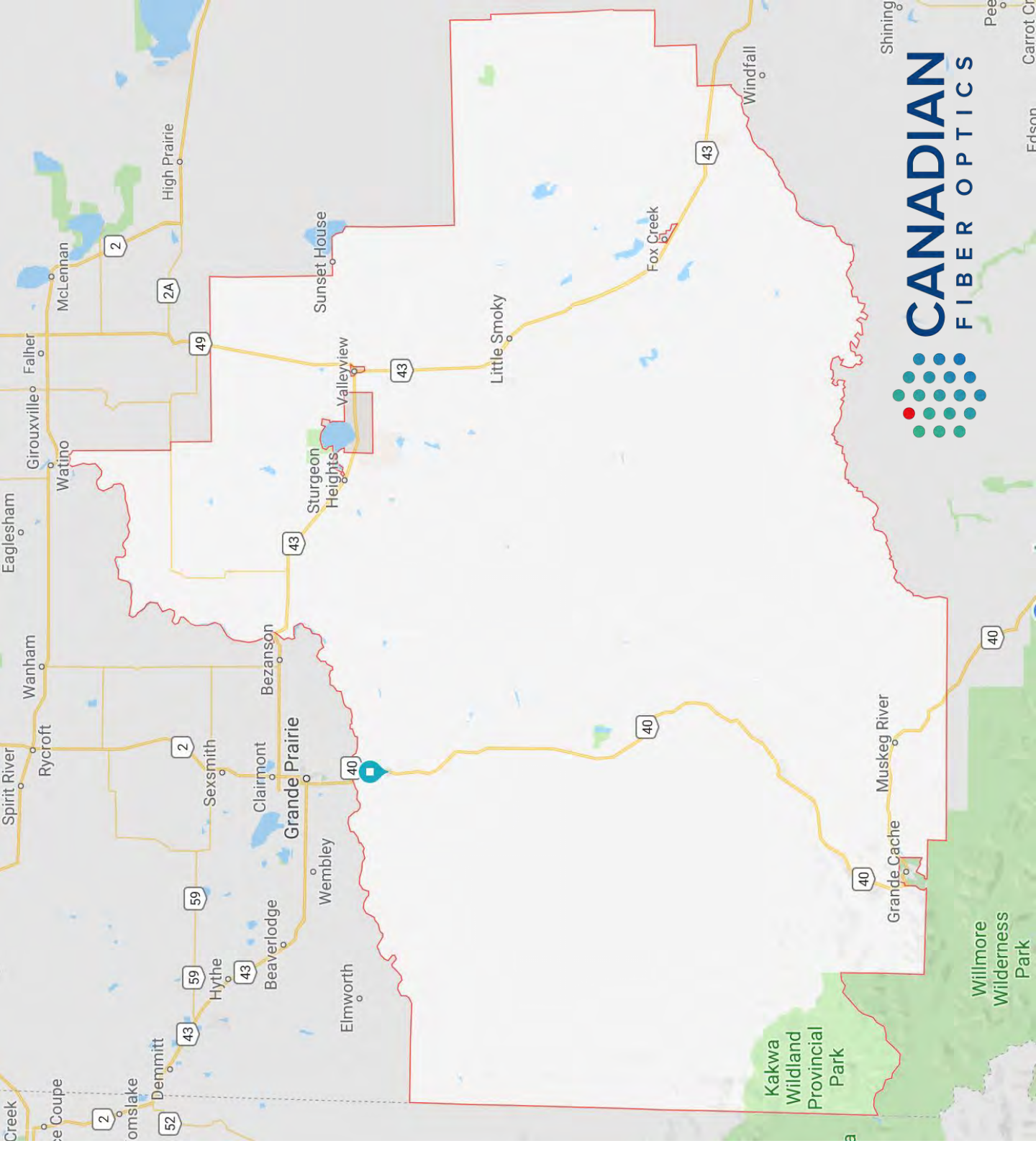

BACKGROUND/PROPOSAL:

The Grande Cache Wayfinding program was an approved Coal Community Transition Fund project listed in the Alberta Economic Development and Trade Grant Agreement that Grande Cache received in 2018. This project was allocated \$40,000 for the consultant and designs of improved Wayfinding in Grande Cache. The project objectives were to hire a consultant to conduct a comprehensive review of the communities existing signage to produce a program to improve wayfinding. An RFP was advertised in March 2019 and the design and recommendations are attached, completed by EDS Inc.

The Grande Cache Wayfinding System Project purpose is to create a clear, modern, mythological sequence of directional and identification elements (wayfinding) for visitors and residents to connect visitors and locals to our natural surroundings, to outline the relevant locations and destinations, and to communicate movement throughout the community to get people to the places they want to get as easy as possible.

Through visually intuitive designs and consistent messaging, the wayfinding program will ensure guidance from Highway 40 into downtown and to Grande Cache’s key destinations, attractions, facilities, trails, recreation and tourism opportunities.

The wayfinding program seeks to outline the relevant locations and destinations to the following, but not limited to - facilities (such as the Grande Cache Municipal Campground from Highway 40 ,Ball Diamonds from Highway 40, Grande Cache Recreation Centre (that includes a state-of-the-art Aquatic Centre, Curling Rink, Arena, Fitness Centre, Spray Park) Grande Cache Labyrinth, Firemen’s Pit, Parks, Grande Cache Golf & Country Club), things to see & do (such as trailhead signage in and around the community for Sulphur Rim and Griffith Trail trailheads for hiking and biking and signage along the trails), downtown and businesses signs from highway. Many of these signs are outdated and worn out. Many of the facility signs have old Town logos on

them which also include the words “Town of Grande Cache” on them. Maps on the trailhead signs are worn out and outdated as many new trails have been developed.

At present, there are a number of groups within the community (The Canadian Death Race, Hiking Committee, Biking Committee, Wilmore Wilderness Foundation and Grande Cache Chamber of Commerce) that are initiating wayfinding for their respective organizations immediately and this has been an opportunity for all groups to work together to create a comprehensive, inclusive, and coordinated wayfinding system in and around the community.

The goal is to make the community easier to navigate and enhance visitor experience as it increases their comfort, builds their confidence and encourages them to discover our unique and attractions. Wayfinding markers along the trails will help visitors and local residents find their way along the trails.

The creative concept of the signage reflects an essence that evokes the following key words: welcoming, clear, easy to follow, modern, innovative, use natural products and promote healthy, active lifestyle in a mountain surrounding.

The scope of the project included:

- 1) EDS Group retained by the MD of Greenview in response to a public Request for Proposals for a Wayfinding Strategy
- 2) Met with stakeholders on three occasions (April 15, May 9, May 23) to educate, learn, share, update on this project
- 3) Developed a family of signage, refined the proposed designs and locations
- 4) Detailed design of various signs, specifying materials and installation
- 5) Developed a cost estimate for near term signage program

This project will enhance the aesthetics of Grande Cache by preventing sign proliferation and encourage signs that complement, rather than detract from the streetscape. The community will be easier to navigate (we have many complaints that people cannot find the Campground, and that our trails are not marked) which will enhance visitor experiences (as it increases their comfort, builds their confidence and encourages them to discover our unique and attractions). It is an opportunity to update our signage from the Town of Grande Cache wording, old ram logo and past Town logo. As many groups, such as the Death Race, the biking club and the trails group are already initiating these types of signages along trails, it provides the opportunity that the signage be consistent, similar in appearance and with purpose to create a comprehensive, inclusive, and coordinated wayfinding system in and around the community.

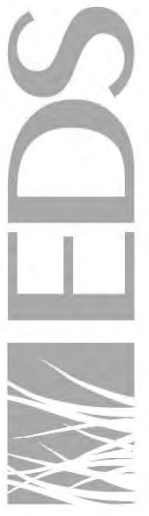

Types of Wayfinding Devices

1. **Directional Signs** – where information is displayed to find destinations, located at several strategic points
2. **Identification Signs** – where information about individual locations is displayed, such as buildings, locations and public amenities
3. **Warning Signs** – to indicate safety procedures such as emergency exit routes, non-smoking areas, park rules or other regulations



Principles of Wayfinding

1. Create a unified palate of colours, shapes and materials.
2. Don't provide too many choices on each sign
3. Provide signs at decision points to signal options
4. Divide different spaces using differing colours
5. Use images where possible, avoiding text. Make icons widely understood



Why a Wayfinding Program for Grande Cache?

- 1) Clearly identify location of various local amenities
- 2) Enhance safety of residents and tourists
- 3) Create a more attractive public realm
- 4) Elevate the community's profile for tourism, and promote economic development
- 5) Coordinate efforts of various local groups with a unified program

Project Scope

- 1) Assess current signage, explore opportunities to re-use existing components where possible
- 2) Meet with local stakeholders to coordinate individual efforts and to meet their needs for signage
- 3) Develop a family of signage for various applications
- 4) Estimate the number of signs required in the near term to properly address wayfinding needs for parks, open space, streetscapes and trails
- 5) Create a community map and a trails map for distribution and promotion of local assets

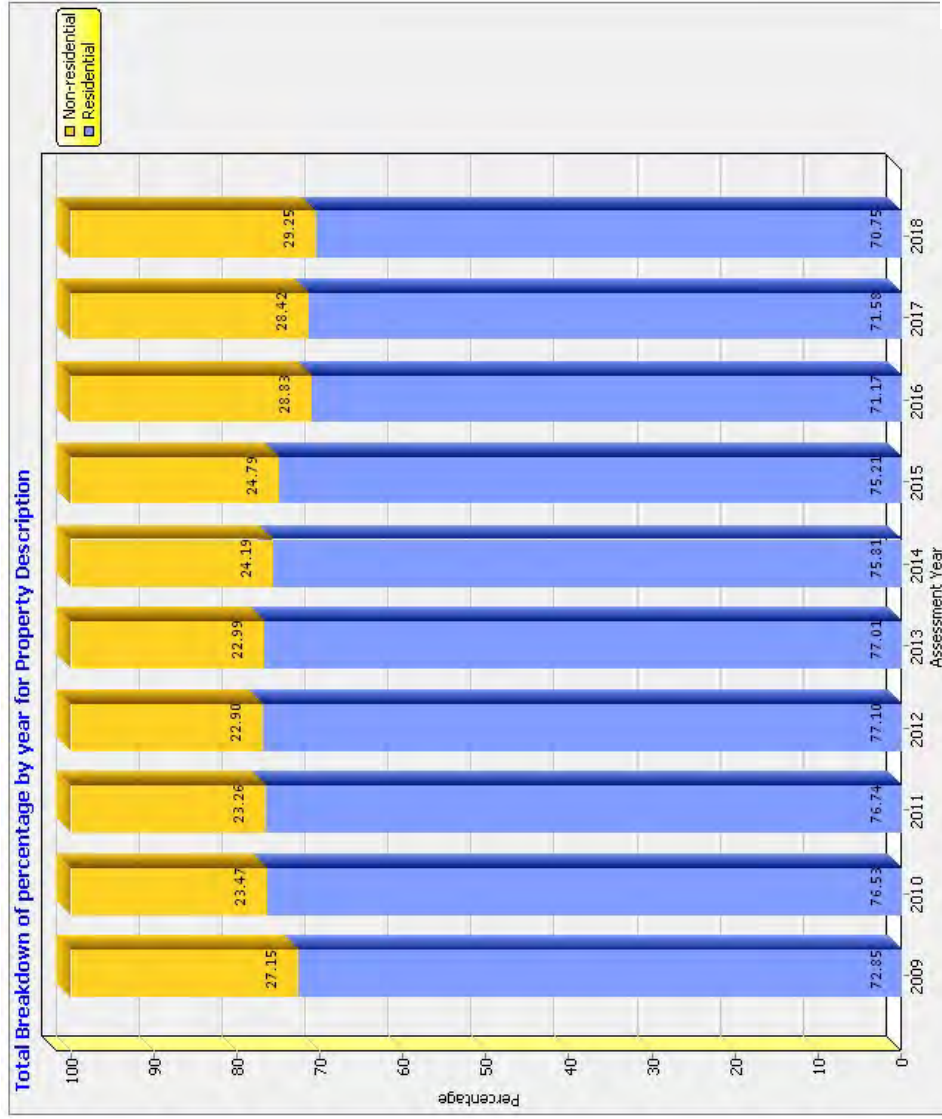
Highlights of the Municipality's Assessment 2014 – 2018 (5 Year Overview)



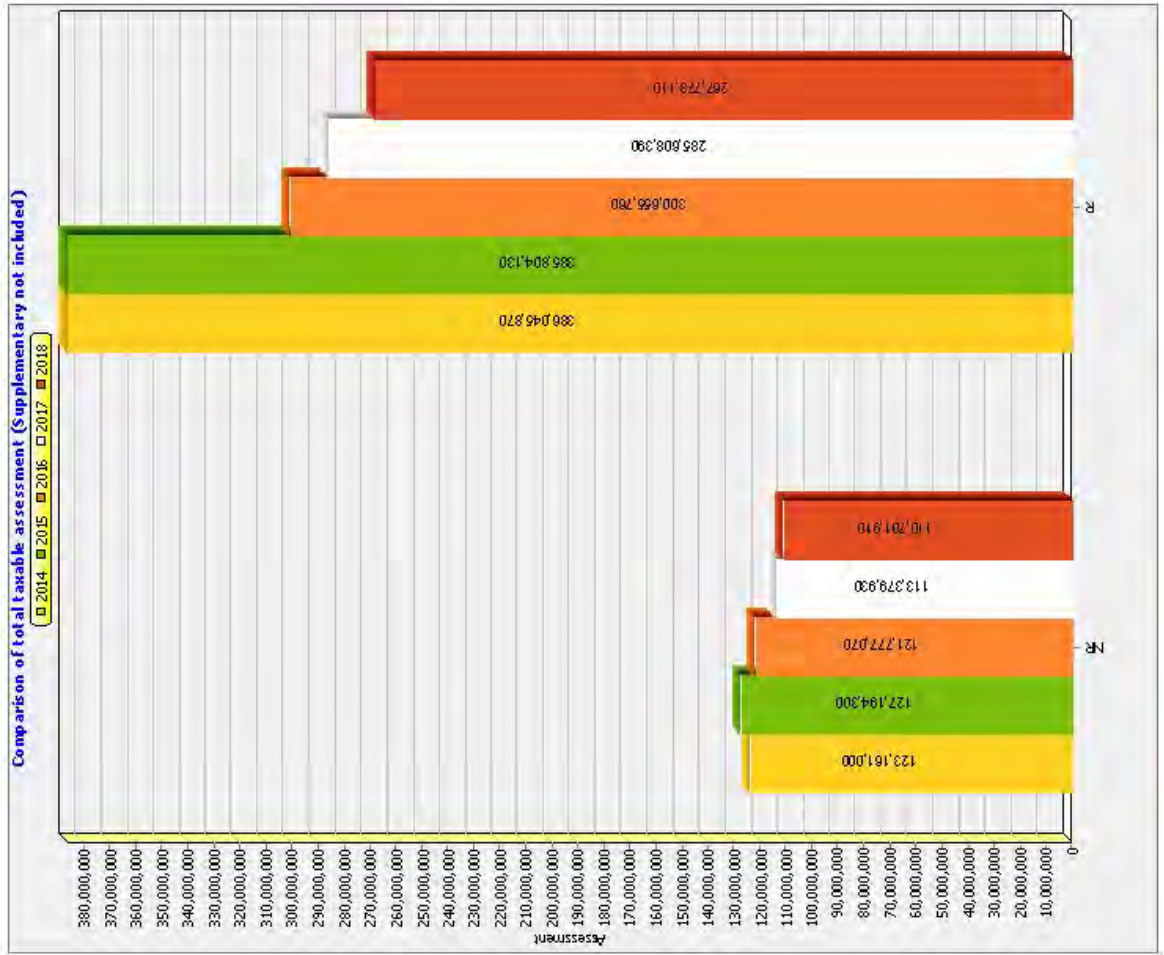
2018 Assessment Breakdown



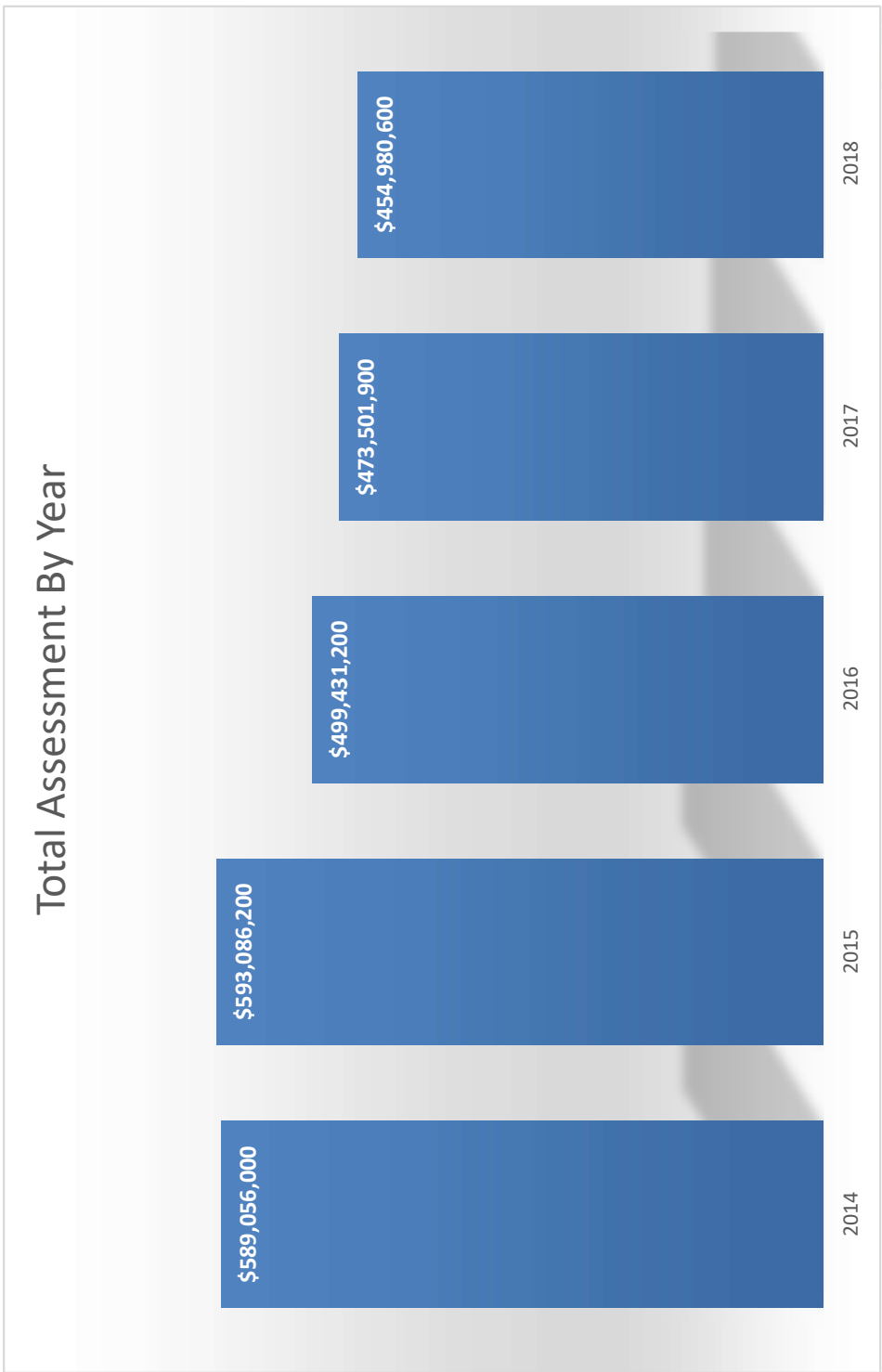

BACKGROUND/PROPOSAL:

The County of Grande Prairie and the City of Grande Prairie have asked the MD of Greenview to participate in the building and operation of a Regional Training Center for firefighter training. The facility will be located at the Dunes Fire Station within the County of Grande Prairie. The location is adjacent to a fire hall, the County currently has a classroom on site, showers, SCBA fill, laundry, overnight accommodations, training fire engine and a large selection of SCBA that could be utilized by all agencies.

This working group is asking for a capital investment of \$500,000.00 over two budget years, 2020 and 2021. With a total capital cost of \$ 1,500,000.00 to be divided equally by the three Municipalities. Greenview firefighters would be able to train at this facility free of charge while utilizing our own training staff.

Administration is considering the following factors for determining the benefit of contributing to this facility:

- The \$500,000.00 building commitment is a heavy cost for training.
- Training on an annual basis equals approximately \$70,000.00 - \$80,000.00 per year for all fire departments within Greenview. Administration does not have sufficient information to assess that a cost savings will result once the training facility is built and operational.
- The facility will result in operational expenses associated with the building and the yard site, maintenance costs and future capital replacement costs. The annual cost of these expenses is anticipated to be \$10,000.00 to \$15,000.00 per municipality. A calendar will be established for booking the facility. Planned training arrangements might conflict with the other municipalities. The working group is planning to generate revenue which could be put into reserve for the facility, with hopes of making the operations cost neutral.
- The facility is located in the County of Grande Prairie, therefore our departments will be required to drive to the facility (mileage cost associated) and there will be meal costs.

- Greenview Firefighters would have better access to mandatory training.
- Greenview Firefighters would have a training Centre close by, and therefore reduce travel and training costs.
