Child porn probe in Alberta uncovers 'extreme' photos, videos

Some victims depicted are estimated by police to be as young as 6 months

A seven-month police investigation into child sexual exploitation has netted the arrest of eight Albertans — six of them from Calgary.

The operation focused on "high-level targets" that were sharing and distributing large collections of child sexual exploitation photos and videos, police in Calgary announced Tuesday.

"This is more than just photos of a kid in the bath. This is graphic sexual abuse, even torture, of children as young as infants," said Det. Justin Brookes, who led the investigation by the Internet Child Exploitation (ICE) unit of the Alberta Law Enforcement Response Teams (ALERT).

Dubbed Operation ICE Storm II, the investigation uncovered more than 14 terabytes of data, which was analyzed by forensic technicians. About 100,000 photos and videos of child exploitation were identified, an official said.

Operation ICE Storm II Results in Arrests of Child Porn Offenders



Brookes said it is challenging for police to keep up with the volume of child exploitation images on the internet, with investigations in his department up 40 per cent over the past four years.

"Sadly, the arrest of these eight offenders is a mere drop in the bucket," he said.

"The reality is that child sexual abuse photos and videos are being shared at a growing rate in our communities."

Investigators do not believe any of the victims are from Alberta, or that any hands-on offences took place in the province.

Strong message

The seized images have been submitted to a database operated by the National Child Exploitation Coordination Centre for further investigation.

Brookes said that while eight arrests may not seem significant, "we're really hoping ... that we send a strong message — that we have no tolerance for people who sexually exploit children. You're not anonymous, we will target you, and bring you to justice."

Here is a look at the investigation by the numbers:

• Eight Albertans arrested: six from Calgary, one from Chipman and another from Sherwood Park

- 16 search warrants executed from September 2014 to March 2015.
- 85 computers and electronic devices seized.
- 14 terabytes of data analyzed.
- 100,000 photos and video of child sexual abuse identified.

An earlier phase of Operation ICE Storm wrapped up in April 2014 with the arrest of 10 offenders.

Speakers

We have contacted Several Guest Speakers to ascertain their likelihood of coming to Grande Prairie for Speaking on the topics of Child Sexual Abuse Images on the Internet in the form Child Pornography.

The speakers would address the connection and prevalence of images to the actual abuse in communities, and how to deal with the aftermath.

We contacted the Beyond Boarders Canadian Non profit, that deals with Child Sexual Exploitation and have looked into their Co-founder Mark Eric Hecht as a possibility.

We contacted the National Center for Justice Training and spoke with David Tellock the program manager about arranging a guest speaker. He provided pricing, and a sample of an event for a Child Advocacy Center in North Carolina and their guest speaker. The speaker is Richard Love.

We have also looked at Donna Rice Hughes and her involvement with making the internet safe for our children.

Costs For Venue and Advertising

We have contacted Q99 our local radio station for advertising quotes. Those were provided by Barb Shannon.

We have contacted the Stonebridge Hotel & Pomeroy group for quotes on a Venue for 100 People and Catering for a daytime Event and an Evening Event. Carla Boyne is the banquet sales coordinator we contacted.

Registration and Site Hosting is free by our local Northwest Regional Learning Center.

Good afternoon ,

It was a pleasure to speak with you this morning about your request for a daytime training presentation to the RCMP, CAC workers and Family Services, followed by an evening session that is open to the public. The National Criminal Justice Training Center (NCJTC) of Fox Valley Technical College has many experienced criminal justice practitioners who can provide the subject matter expertise you need on the topic areas of your inquiry.

As I indicated during our phone conversation, NCJTC has several large program grants in the areas of Missing & Exploited Children, Internet Crimes Against Children and AMBER Alert. I was hoping that we could tap into their grant to reduce the costs of your request. Unfortunately, our Program Administrator advised that the use of those grant funds is limited to the United States; however we can provide the training as a fee based training.

For budgetary purposes, the estimated cost to bring the 1-day training to your location will be approximately \$7,300. The cost may be reduced somewhat, depending on where the instructor is coming from and the associated travel costs. This will include:

- Instructor airfare, baggage, ground transportation, lodging, per diem
- Instructor prep time, travel time and on-site instruction
- Staff support for marketing, logistics, registration assistance, material preparation, printing student materials, shipping, evaluations and certificates of course completion

Fox Valley Technical College will provide you with a marketing flyer for distribution and can assist in marketing, if needed. We will place the course information on our website with a link for advance registration and can send out emails to specific groups if you have a distribution list. At the conclusion of the training we will have the participants provide us with a brief evaluation. We will compile the information from the evaluation and provide you with a summary of student ratings/comments about the training and instructor. We will also send each participant of the daytime training a certificate of completion from the National Criminal Justice Training Center of Fox Valley Technical College.

You expressed interest in several topical areas, including Internet Crimes Against Children, Sexual Abuse of Children and Forensic Interviewing. We have excellent instructors in these areas and can make them available for you. I mentioned that we are going to be delivering a training to a CAC in North Carolina with a similar audience and timeframe. I'm not sure if this fits your training need, but I've included a description as another option for your consideration.

Daytime Presentation

Sexual Exploitation of Children via Technology: The Dangers and Risk They Face (4 hours)

Participants will be provided information regarding the problem of technology crimes against children. The presentation will discuss the varied risks that technology poses to children, concentrating on the problem of sexual exploitation and abuse. Participants will learn about the different offenders such as the Preferential, Situational, Intra-familiar and others and how they utilize technology to victimize children. Child victim issues such as the compliant teen and child victim interview considerations will be discussed. Also child sexual abuse images and child erotica will be presented had how offenders use it to groom children. Social networking sites and applications such as SnapChat, Instagram, CraigsList, Virtual Worlds, Live Gaming, Periscope, Layar and others, along with how they work and are used by children and offenders will be presented. Participants will learn what Sextortion and Sexting are and the legal ramifications children face. In addition, Cyberbullying Issues will be discussed as well as 21 prevention methods. Actual case examples will be utilized throughout the presentation to illustrate teaching points as well as class participation.

Child Sex Trafficking and Technology (1.5 hours)

Participants will be presented information on how technology is being used in Child Sex Trafficking and the exploitation of children. Online advertisements exploiting children will be examined and where and how investigators can find them. The pimp's subculture and how the initial recruiting behavior of the pimp and child victim develops, along with different culture heritage and gang influence. In addition, dealing with the child after their victimization will be discussed and a case study into a National Child Sexual Trafficking operation and methods will be presented. Open class participation will be utilized.

Open Discussion Workshop (1.0 hour)

Evening Presentation

The evening presentation will be on prevention and is intended for parent and child with open participation. This session is planned for 2 hours.



- The Alberta Works Employment and Career Request for Proposals has been posted on the Alberta Purchasing Connection website. Under the current contract the Green View Community Resource Center receives an annual maximum of \$46,200 for career and employment services provided. The current contract will expire March 31, 2016 and administration will submit the proposal prior to the closing date of February 26th.
- A "Managing Stress for the Caregiver" workshop will be offered at the DeBolt Centre March 4 and Grovedale Seniors Centre March 11th. This 2 hours workshop includes topics on identifying individual stressors and management strategies.
- The 2016 Program Guide has been printed and is available to the public.
- The Seniors Housing Questionnaire/Needs Assessment survey is now available online and in Administration offices. The survey will be open until May 23, at which point the results will be reported to Council.
- The Grande Cache Home Support Pilot project continues to expand. The program now serves 6 Greenview residents living in the Co-ops. Feedback from residents utilizing the program has been very positive.
- Alberta Works staff will be providing a budgeting workshop, "Stretching Your Dollars" on February 24. This workshop will open to all residents and will be hosted at the Green View Community Resource Centre.
- Sexually transmitted infections in Valleyview and area are significantly higher than the other
 parts of Alberta. Administration is gauging interest, through an online survey, in a sexual
 health information night. If information about sexually transmitted diseases and
 contraception would be of benefit to residents, FCSS could host a session in partnership with
 HIV North.

A decline in clients optimism about the economy and their ability to change their current situation has been noticable in the month of January. Many employment clients have applied numerous times to the same local businesses and are facing the same feedback that they are not currently hiring. The economy is increasing the need for income support. Employers are reducing hours and pay, and families that were accustomed to a certain income level and quality of life are now having to adjust to dramatic wage decreases. This is certainly causing challenges as they do not necessarily meet the income level of services provided by Alberta Works Income Support, therefore can not get extra income to assist with paying bills. A budgeting workshop called "Stretching Your Dollars" will be provided by Alberta Works on February 24 at the Community Resource Center at no cost to the participants.

Computer Basics classes started in January with 10 new participants to the class. Both sessions in January had excellent turnouts with 15 in the first class and 13 in the second.

Programs completed in January, 2016:

- St. Stephen's Catholic School:
 - o KIDO (grade 6): *Program educates students on issues including bullying, domestic abuse, substance abuse, and online safety.*
 - o Girls group (grade 4/5): Program helps students develop social competencies.
- Ridgevalley School:
 - o Hands are not for Hitting (grade 1): Program helps student gain restraint skills.
 - O I Can Handle Anger (grade 2): Program teaches students how to deal with anger in a healthy way.
 - o Girls groups (grade 3 and grade 8)
- Penson School:
 - Cool Camp (grade 8; January 22, 2016): This program provides the same information as SKILLS but due to distance is presented in a one day format. It provides students with factual information equipping them to resist pressure to become sexually involved before they are ready. The program also promotes healthy relationships and responsible decision making.

Programs continuing in February, 2016:

- St. Stephen's Catholic School:
 - o Girls groups (grades 6/7)
 - o SKILLS (grade 8): This program provides students information on healthy relationships, domestic abuse, and mental health.
- Harry Gray Elementary:
 - o Girls Groups (grade 4; 3 groups)
- Ridgevalley School
 - SKILLS (grade 8): An evolution of Cool Camp, this program provides students with factual information equipping them to resist pressure to become sexually involved before they are ready.
 - WhyTry? (grade 9): Program teaches that although making good choices can be difficult, doing so results in more opportunity, freedom, and self-respect.
