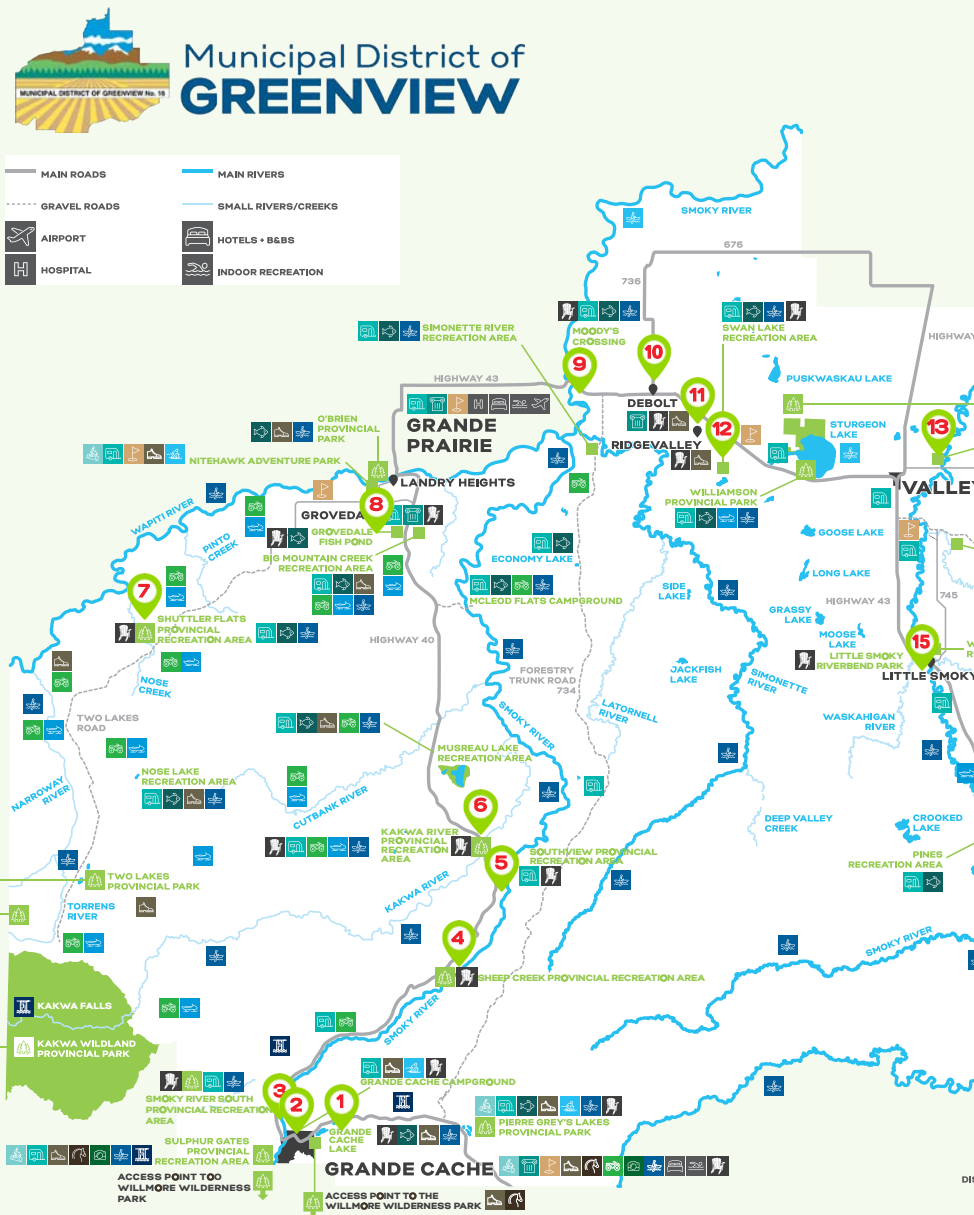
Getting Here

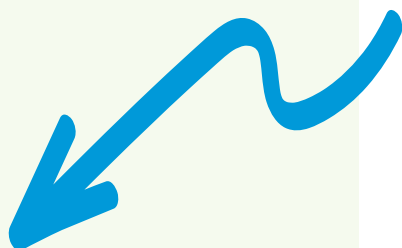
Where is the MD of Greenview? Greenview is closer than you think:

Welcome to the MD of Greenview, Alberta's third-largest rural municipality, offering a unique mix of business, cultural, and recreational opportunities across its scenic "meadows to mountains" landscape.

The MD of Greenview includes the hamlets of Little Smoky, Ridgevalley, DeBolt, Landry Heights, Grande Cache and Grovedale. Our borders encompass the Sturgeon Lake Cree Nation and the towns of Fox Creek, and Valleyview, while Grande Prairie is our neighbour to the west. Well-connected by Highways 40, 43, and 49, railways, and Grande Prairie's airport, Greenview is easily accessible.

Greenview's diverse landscape features scenic rivers, brilliant blue lakes, untouched prairies, fertile farmland, and the majestic Rocky Mountains. Recreation centers in Grande Cache, Valleyview and Fox Creek, provide year-round sports, programs and activities.

Greenview's diverse geography offers adventure and thrill-seekers an experience to remember. Long winding rivers and endless lakes provide unlimited water activity opportunities. Mountain peaks and prairie meadows showcase impeccable views of the Rocky Mountains, and the untamed wilderness promises an abundance of outdoor activities.

With the spectacular panoramic vistas of the Canadian Rockies only two short hours south of Grande Prairie, **Grande Cache** offers endless tourism and recreation opportunities.

Valleyview area offers beautiful scenery running along the **Little Smoky River** where fishing enthusiasts can catch Rainbow Trout, Burbot and Grayling. Numerous trails along the rivers invite ATV adventures, camping, and more. Recreational and camping areas such as **Young's Point** and **Williamson Provincial Park**, both on **Sturgeon Lake**, offer fishing, swimming, and golfing in the summer, and ice fishing in the winter.

Southeast of Valleyview, discover the scenic **Johnson Park** at the corner of Highway 665 and Little Smoky Road. With walking trails along the **Goose River**, day-use sites with fire pits and picnic tables, and a 20-stall camping loop, Johnson Park is open year-round and offers winter activities like cross-country skiing and snowshoeing on maintained trails.

Recreation and cultural facilities abound, with a variety of museums, arenas, golf courses, day-use sites and campgrounds.

For a quieter experience, visitors to Grande Cache can unwind at **Labyrinth Park**, where 360-degree mountain views and a serene atmosphere invite peaceful reflection.

Spectacular *Sights*

Greenview is a hidden gem filled with wild rivers, stunning blue lakes, pristine prairie meadows, and the breathtaking peaks of the Rocky Mountains. With modern indoor facilities, you can enjoy sports and recreational activities all year round. While Greenview's potential is still a well-kept secret, its incredible tourism possibilities won't stay under the radar for much longer! Come and explore all that Greenview has to offer!

Sulphur Gates

A popular attraction and must-see spot in the region is Sulphur Gates. This spectacular viewpoint overlooks the confluence of the Smoky and Sulphur Rivers, showcasing dramatic cliff edges and amazing mountain views. Located a short drive and easy hike from Grande Cache.



Kakwa Falls

Within the Kakwa Wildland Provincial Park, the Kakwa River cascades 30 metres over Kakwa Falls, rushes through a 4 km canyon, then plunges over the second set of falls, making this the tallest waterfall in Alberta. Smaller waterfalls, including the popular Eaton Falls, Muskeg Falls, and Twin Falls are located in the Grande Cache area.





Hiking & *Biking & Horseback Rides*

From hiking the dramatic Crack of Doom at Sulphur Gates to mountain biking the Griffiths Trail or exploring over 2,700 km of trails suited for everything from short walks to multi-day backpacking adventures, Greenview is an outdoor playground for every kind of explorer. Just south and east of Grande Prairie, a vast trail network and wilderness areas invite visitors to hike, fish, hunt, camp, snowmobile, ski, and ride all-terrain vehicles. Follow Highway 43 through a landscape rich in adventure, where agritourism, outdoor recreation, and natural beauty await at every turn.

For the thrill-seeking visitor, try **Nitehawk Year- Round Adventure Park**.

Just Southeast of Valleyview, situated on the corner of Highway 665 and the Little Smoky Road, you will find the scenic **Johnson Park** with walking trails bordering the Goose River and day-use sites that include fire-pits and picnic tables along with a camping loop of 20 stalls. Johnson Park is open year-round, offering opportunity to cross country ski or snowshoe through staff-maintained trails throughout the winter months.



In the Grande Cache area, enjoy a back country horseback excursion by heading to one of the staging areas in the region providing easy access into the **Willmore Wilderness Park**.

Passport to the Peaks program celebrates the beauty of the area by identifying the ring of mountains that surround the hamlet of Grande Cache. The 21-mountain peak hiking incentive program is divided into Bronze, Silver & Gold categories, depending on the level of difficulty to reach the summits.

Purchase your Passport to the Peaks book at the Grande Cache Tourism & Interpretive Centre. There are cairns on each of the 21 mountain peaks to stamp your Passport once you reach each summit! When you complete each group of peaks, you will qualify for a distinctive pin. Your accomplishment will be recognized in the Grande Cache Tourism & Interpretive Centre.



Water Adventures

Long winding rivers and endless lakes provide unlimited water activity opportunities. Abundant lakes, rivers, and creeks wind their way through Greenview. You can find over 20 boat launches giving you access to many of the lakes within the region to enjoy boating, water sports, fishing and swimming. If you're feeling extra adventurous, boat or canoe to the island across Grande Cache Lake for a truly remote experience or raft the white waters on the crazy rivers in the foothills of the Rocky Mountains on a guided river tour.

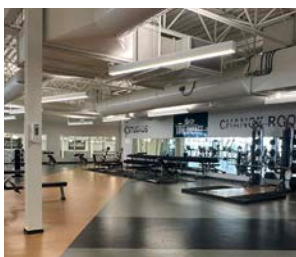
Facilities

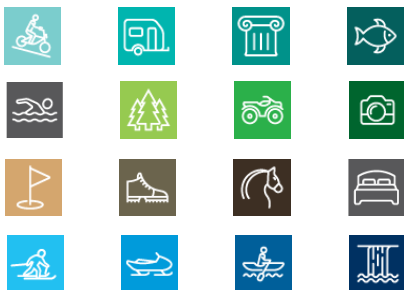

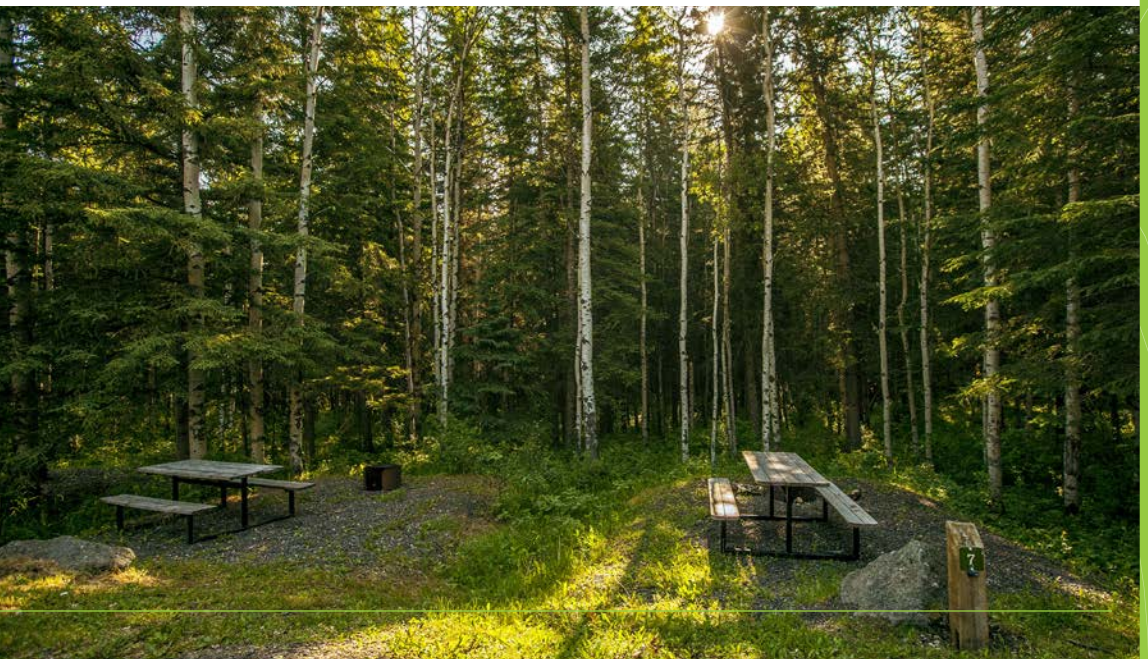

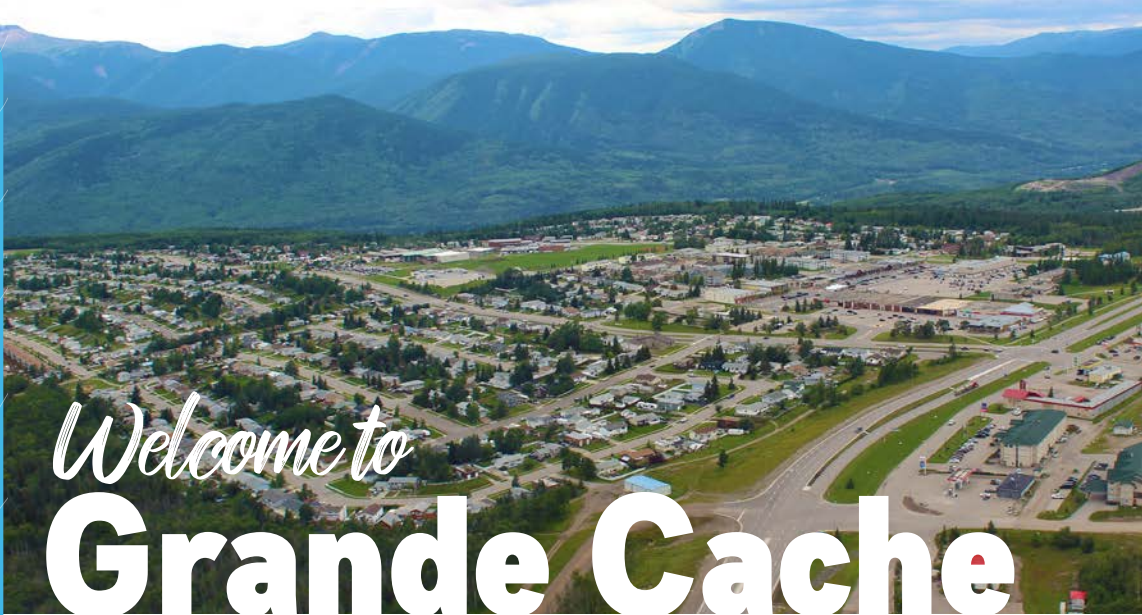

Welcome to Grande Cache

Grande Cache is a scenic hamlet nestled on the northeastern slopes of the Rocky Mountains along Highway 40, also known as the Bighorn Highway or Scenic Route to Alaska.

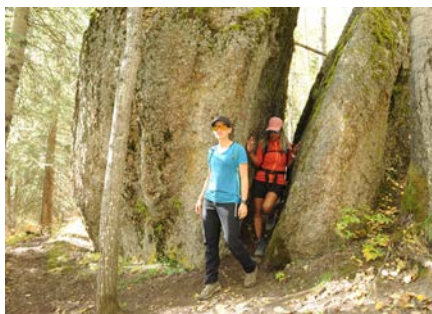

Tour Sulphur Gates

Sulphur Gates is one of the most popular natural attractions around Grande Cache due to its impressive views and accessibility. Here you will experience the cliff-edged confluence of two rivers, the Smoky and the Sulphur from four different lookout platforms. The dramatic rock formations clearly define the two rivers as they connect in stark contrast. You will follow the parking area along a short trail that leads to the platforms providing a majestic view of the area. **CAUTION:** Please stay behind the protective guardrails and wear proper footwear, as some areas can become quite slippery at times.

In addition to the amazing views, Sulphur Gates also offers a fantastic equestrian staging area and campsites with access to the Willmore Wilderness Park for horseback riders, day hiking and backpackers looking for an authentic backcountry experience. Located at the commercial staging area, just before the public staging area, you will discover a short trail to the right of the first corral that leads to the Split Rock (refer to photo on the left).

Go Fishing

DISCOVER A WATERFALL

① Eaton Falls

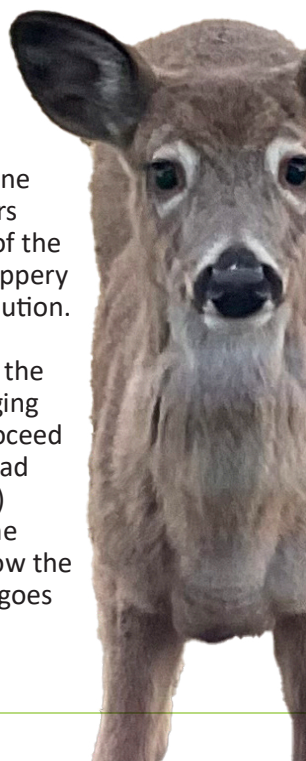
EATON FALLS: 3.5 km one way

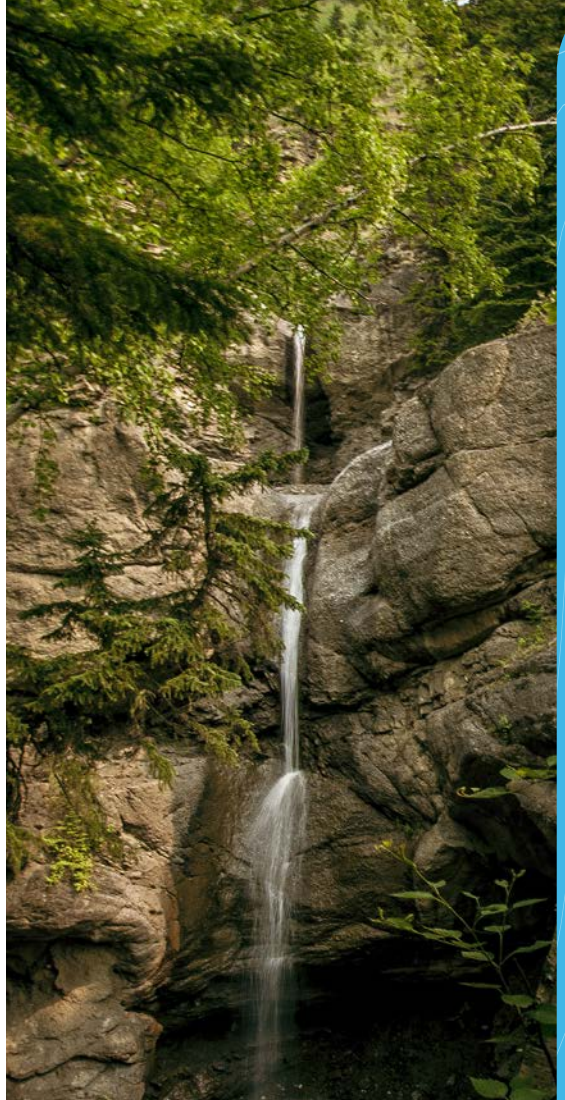
This is usually the first spot that people head to in Willmore Wilderness Park. It is mostly a moderate hike on a clearly defined trail through lightly forested areas, but there are some challenging hills at the start! The trail extends for about 2 km over hills and gullies. A trail will then branch off the main trail to the right and is marked by an old moose antler with the words “Eaton Falls” inscribed on it. (This trail marker is very easy to miss and the trail itself is rather narrow). Walk about another 500 meters and you will see and hear Eaton Falls.

The falls flow over an enormous rock face from jagged cliffs high above the treetops.

A refreshing, cool breeze will greet you as you approach the falls. Many large rocks line the final few meters towards the base of the falls, making for slippery conditions. Use caution.

Location: Drive to the Sulphur Gates Staging Area. Park and proceed to the large trailhead (southwest corner) at the far end of the parking area. Follow the downhill trail that goes to the right.





② Muskeg Falls

Muskeg Falls is our most stunning waterfall, and the hike is fairly short. Most of the trail is an easy walk through spruce forests, but the trail then descends sharply to the falls, with tricky footing. Use extreme caution: much of the cliff edges are very unstable, and the rocks are slippery. The upper trail to the right will take you along the top ridge of the riverbank, directly above the falls. The fork to the left goes to the bottom edge of the falls. Both are very steep.

Location: Drive 16 km south on Highway 40 and turn into the first rest stop on the left hand side (north side) of the road. There's a small trail, usually flagged, off to the north.

③ Twin Falls

A popular short hike that's great for families or those seeking something less challenging. A small set of falls, it's an interesting hike as the surrounding terrain changes frequently, so you may be doing a bit of route-finding!

The trailhead is about 11 km north of town, then a short drive off the highway to where the hike begins. The ground around the falls and creek can be quite unstable, so use caution!

Location: To reach the trailhead, drive 11.3 km north of Grande Cache on HWY 40 and turn left onto the dirt road. Follow this about 0.7 km to where it reaches a power line and dead ends at Hells Creek. The trail leads up the south side of the creek to a signed viewpoint of the Falls.

LAKES & CREEKS



Pierre Grey's Lake

Fish: Brook, Bull & Rainbow Trout

This popular location was named after local fur trader/ trapper Pierre Grey, who ran a trading post at the series of small lakes bearing his name today. The remnants of his trading post from the late 1800's can still be seen today. Located 33 km south on Highway 40, Pierre Grey's Lakes is a string of 5 lakes full of Rainbow Trout, Brook Trout and Bull Trout. Excellent for canoeing, kayaking or boating (electric motors only), Pierre Grey's Lakes offer a quiet escape for one to also enjoy camping and hiking or winter activities such as snowshoeing or cross country skiing.

Victor Lake

Fish: Rainbow Trout

This serene little lake is 2 kms outside of the Hamlet of Grande Cache. Scenic and abounding with local wildlife, no motorized boats are permitted on this lake making it ideal for kayaking, canoeing and fishing for Rainbow Trout. Victor Lake can be accessed by turning onto a dirt road on the right side of Highway 40 heading south 2 km out of Grande Cache.

Located 5 km south of Town on Highway 40. A popular destination in the summer heat! Great for enjoying water sports, mountain views, year round fishing for Brook and Rainbow Trout. The lake features a natural beach, day use picnic areas with fire pits, boat launch & dock and the Rotary Playground. You can also enjoy a picnic on the island across the lake.

Mason Creek

Located approximately 20 km south of Grande Cache on Hwy 40, you will find the Mason Creek Provincial Recreation Area. Mason Creek begins at A La Pêche Lake and flows into the Muskeg River.

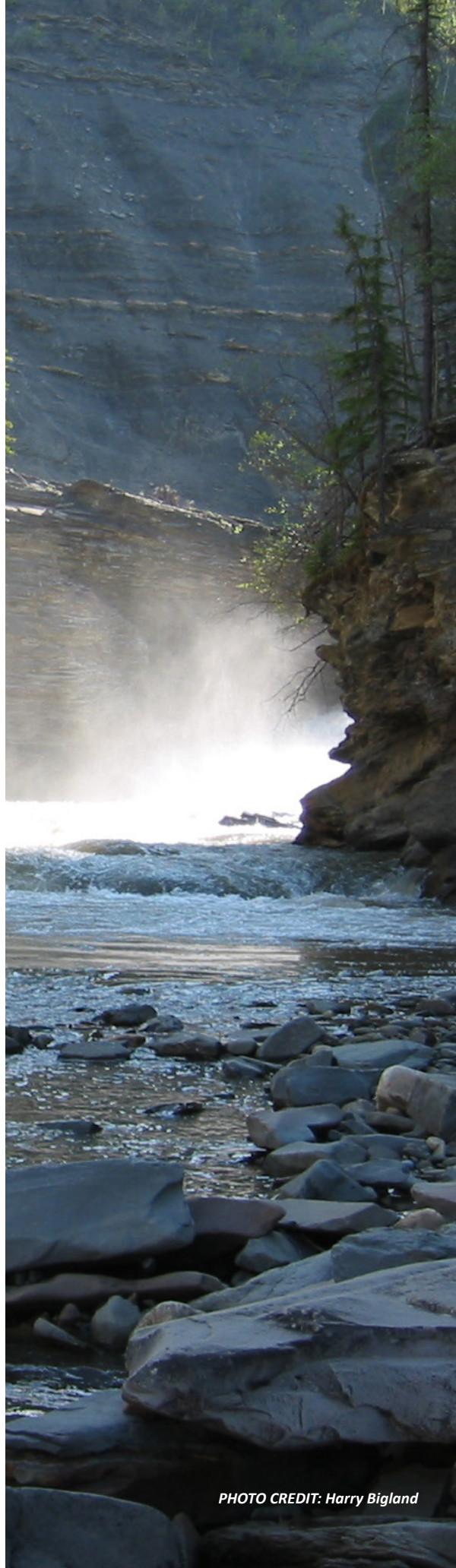

Because of their vulnerability, Alberta Environment and Parks has implemented a zero possession limit on these species. Please use care and release these species immediately.

WILLMORE WILDERNESS PARK

Grande Cache is the gateway to Willmore Wilderness Park which comprises 4,597 square kilometres of pure, unspoiled mountain wilderness. Willmore Wilderness Park is a pristine mountainous area with rugged forest and alpine expanses. The rivers and creeks are crystal clear, and fast moving streams are a good source of drinking water. The park is a paradise for outdoor enthusiasts. The only mode of transportation allowed in the mountain Park is by foot, horseback or bicycle. Motorized vehicles are not allowed in the park.

Care should be taken when venturing into the backcountry. Safety is the first consideration when travelling in Willmore Wilderness Park. Travellers in this remote area should have extensive outdoor experience or hire an experienced guide or outfitter for their expedition.

One can choose to hike, take horseback riding trips or mountain bike. The trails consist of historical routes used by the outfitters and fur trappers dating back to the early 1800s. Some of these are as follows: Indian Trail, Mountain Trail, Sheep Creek Trail, Pope Thoreau Trail and Big Grave Flats to name a few. If you

wish to traverse the Continental Divide, several passes are: Casket, Forget-Me-Not, Fetherstonhaugh and Morkill.

EQUESTRIAN STAGING AREAS

Sulphur Gates Staging Area

Sulphur Gates provides holding corrals and camping facilities to act as your base camp. Visitors may take a day trip to Kvass Flats to view the beautiful meadows, or climb **Mt. Stearn** to see spectacular mountain vistas. The more adventurous can explore the backcountry with a week's trip to the **Sheep Creek Forestry cabin**. A day's travel west will take travellers to **Casket Lake** and the **Continental Divide Trail to Jackpine Pass** and the BC border, or **Bess Pass Trail**.

Cowlick Creek Staging Area

Allows visitors access to the Willmore Wilderness Park's eastern borders. From **Cowlick Creek Staging Area**, you can head to **Big Grave Flats** where many trails branch off to **Rocky Pass**, **Snow Creek Trail**, **A La Pêche Lake**, **Whistler Trail**, **Glacier Pass**, **Eagle's Nest Pass** or the **Rock Lake Staging Area**.

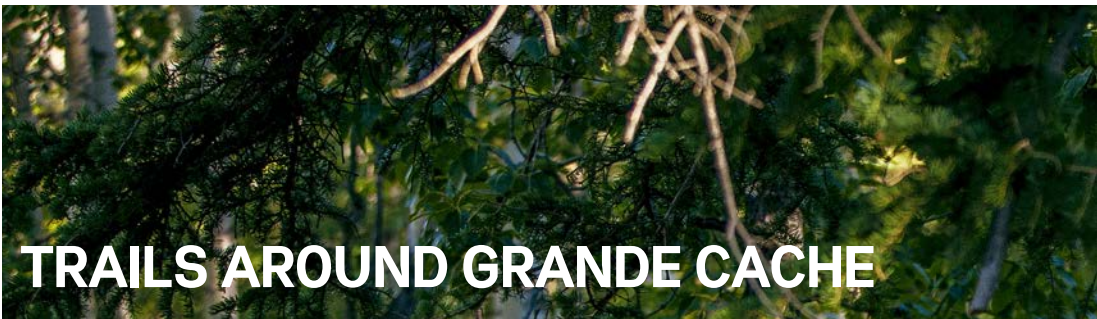
TRAILS: HIKE, BIKE & GEO-CACHE!

There are hundreds of kilometres of trails around Grande Cache for the adventurous hikers, bikers, and equestrian riders to explore. Enjoy a short day-hike or a multi-day trek into the backcountry. Some of the more popular short hiking trails are listed here; however, you will find many more trails and descriptions listed in the Grande Cache Trails Map.

Geo-Caching

A geo-cache is a hidden object, place, or feature that you can locate by using a GPS Receiver. It's a fun and rewarding activity that is available across the globe. Grande Cache has several geocaches. The locations and coordinates of each can be found by accessing Geocaching.com. Enjoy the hunt!

TRAILS AROUND GRANDE CACHE

Sulphur Rim Trail

7.5 km circuit

This is a well-used trail enjoyed by hikers and runners. Keep note of the directional markers along the way as several trail junctions can become confusing if not paying attention. This forested trail follows along the Sulphur River Canyon, which provides an opportunity to enjoy some spectacular views. This trail is also a portion of the Canadian Death Race Leg 5, and its trailhead is located on Hoppe Avenue before the entrance leading to the Grande Cache Institution.

Sulphur Gates

0.2 km one way

This is one of the most travelled trails in the area due to its accessibility to magnificent views! The trail is in the Sulphur Gates Provincial Recreation Area, the main staging area to access Willmore Wilderness Park. A short hike will lead you to the first of four platforms built on the cliff edge overlooking the confluence of the Smoky and Sulphur Rivers. The upper two platforms provide the best views of all, but may be challenging for some. Footing can be difficult in some areas due to erosion; please ensure to take care and utilize the handrails and guardrails in place to ensure your safety, especially in wet conditions.

Length	Description
21.9 km one way	Highest elevation 1493m, lowest elevation 1353m. Access Point #1 - South on Hwy 40 to Cowlick Creek staging area. Follow Cowlick Creek trail first. Access point # 2 – Drive to the east end of the Foothills Mill site and follow the Haul Road to the Muskeg Main (just before the railway crossing). Watch for a large gas well site on your left and the Muskeg River valley to the south. There is a gate across the road and this is your start point. Obtain permission from the Mill beforehand.
0.5 km	Highest elevation 1142m, lowest elevation 1129m. Narrow and single track. Access – Along the north east branch of the Sulphur Rim trail or south side of Fireman's Pit Upper Connector.
1 km one way	Dirt / gravel surface. Highest elevation 1140m, lowest elevation 1130m. Access – As you move in a south west direction on the Sulphur Rim Trail you will intersect the Fireman's Pit upper connector which heads northwest.
20 km loop	Technically advanced. Lowest elevation 1035m, highest elevation 1990m. Competent downhill skills are necessary for this ride or walking. Access south of town roughly 6km on the north side of Hwy 40 and stay on road to the right that follows Carconte Creek.
4.3 km one way	Highest elevation 1247m, lowest elevation 1135m. Some of the climbs are rated moderate. Popular trail for walking, hiking, and jogging. Access to the Griffith Trail – This trail circles our town so there are many access points from behind homes that border on the bush side with lanes behind them.
7.5 km loop	This trail may be muddy in spots. Highest elevation 1173m, lowest elevation 1092m. Trailhead is at the bottom of Hoppe Ave located west of Grande Cache across from Water Treatment Plant Road.
25 km (out and back)	Technically moderate, physically difficult (uphill return). Lowest elevation 945m, highest elevation 1220m. Access from Water Treatment Plant Rd at the bottom of Hoppe Ave. Head along for 1.5km until a multi-trail crosses the road. Take the trail in front of you on your left. Continue taking trails leading down until you come to the Smoky River.



Griffiths Trail

1.5 - 15 km

This trail is popular for walking, running, and biking and has many access points situated along the perimeter of Grande Cache. You can enjoy this trail in segments or in its entirety; the adventure is yours. Follow the directional markers in place to ensure that you remain on the main trail, as there are several junctions along the way. You will find the main trailhead sign located north of Hoppe Avenue in the southwest corner of the hamlet.

Lakes Trail

5 km one way

This short trail begins in Grande Cache, leads you down to Victor Lake, and proceeds until you reach Grande Cache Lake. The trail starts with a downhill portion close to the south entrance of town, across from the Grande Cache Tourism & Interpretive Centre. Once you reach Victor Lake, you can proceed along the canal and into a forested area that eventually leads to the beach and day-use area located at Grande Cache Lake.

MOUNTAIN HIKES

Grande Mountain

1,988 m 5.3 km one way

The steep trail leading up the cutline of Grande Mountain can be seen from the hamlet, and it encourages many locals and travellers to hike to its summit. Access can be gained by climbing along the steep power-line trail (by the Cemetery) or by accessing the back of the mountain (which does add distance but significantly decreases difficulty). ATV enthusiasts enjoy accessing the back trail, but it also makes for a wonderful day hike with amazing views from the top. Grande Mountain trail also covers a portion of Leg 2 in the Canadian Death Race.

Mount Louie

1,844 m 5.5 km one way

Mount Louie has a well-marked trail and has the smallest elevation gain of all the summits in the area, but do not take this for granted. Views present themselves early along the trail that meanders through a combination of forest and exposed rock along the northwest ridge. The trail ends with a challenging steep ascend as you approach the summit. Access to this trail can be found at the Cowlick Creek Staging Area.

Mount Stearn

2,013 m 7.6 km one way

This mountain overlooks Grande Cache to the west and can be distinguished by its knobby summit. The trail is considered a challenging day hike but gives plenty of opportunities to rest along alpine

meadows before ascending to the summit. The views of Grande Cache, Willmore Wilderness Park and Lightning Ridge make this trek well worth the effort.

Access to the trailhead can be found on Sulphur Gates Road with its blue trailhead sign located on the right with parking located on the opposite side of the gravel road.

Ambler Mountain

1,905 m 3.8 km one way

This moderate trail leads through fields of wild alpine flora, making this trail a favourite day hike for many. The trailhead is accessible by driving approximately 6.5 km up Beaverdam Road, around 8 km north of Grande Cache on Hwy 40. There is a signed crossroad with Hamel to the right and the Ambler Loop Trail to the left.

Mount Hamell

1,988 m 4.6 - 9.8 km

Mount Hamell is the dramatic mountain to the north of Grande Cache and is well known for its incredible strata and for being the toughest and highest elevation summit in the Canadian Death Race. One can take several routes to the top depending on skill level and comfort. The south access is more moderate but adds quite a bit of distance to the summit, while the northeast ridge is much shorter and steeper. Refer to the Grande Cache Trails Map for more detailed routes and descriptions.

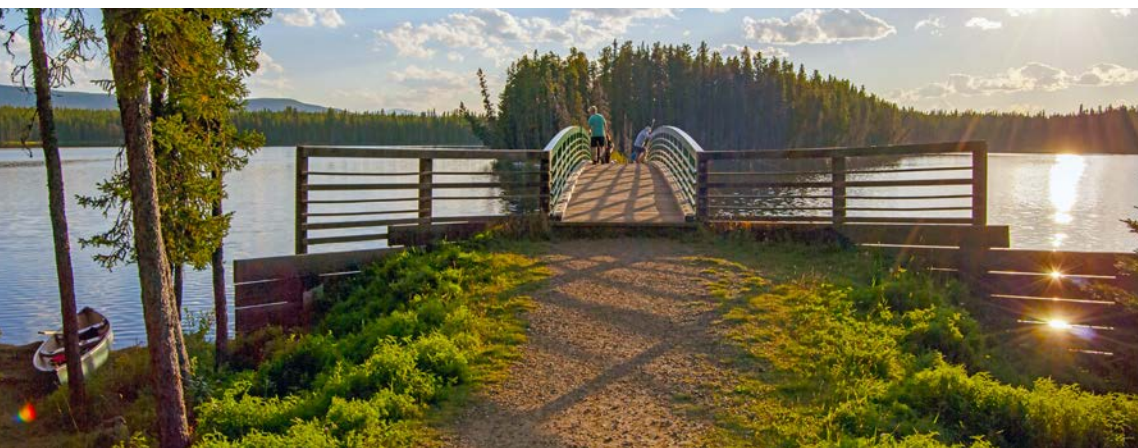


Passport to Peaks

The Passport to the Peaks program highlights 21 mountain peaks around Grande Cache, offering bronze, silver, and gold levels based on difficulty. Each summit has a Cairn box for stamping your passport.

Pierre Grey's Lakes Trails

Pierre Grey's Lakes Provincial Park offers great opportunities for fishing, canoeing, hiking, biking, camping, or relaxing in nature. Located 32 km south of Grande Cache along Highway 40, on the east side of the Highway. Trails meander along the shores of pristine trout-filled waters and lead through old-growth lodgepole pine and spruce forest.

While enjoying the trails, you can also visit the remains of Pierre Grey's trading post established during the fur trade era. This historic site is a short 1.6 km walk from the Moberly Loop boat launch or 3.8 km from the McDonald Day Use Area.

CANADIAN DEATH RACE TRAILS

118 km • 41 km • Relay

Since the start of the millennium, racers have come to Grande Cache to cheat death in one of the world's toughest ultra-marathons. The 118 km course begins and ends on a 4200-foot plateau, passes over three mountain summits, and not only includes over 17,000 feet of elevation change, but also a major river crossing at the spectacular Hell's Gate canyon at the confluence of the Smoky and Sulphur Rivers. Each August long-weekend, extreme athletes push themselves to the limits of their endurance against the breathtaking background of the Canadian Rocky Mountains. The Canadian Death Race combines some of the best trails in the area with viewpoints and scenery that only a few people ever get to enjoy.

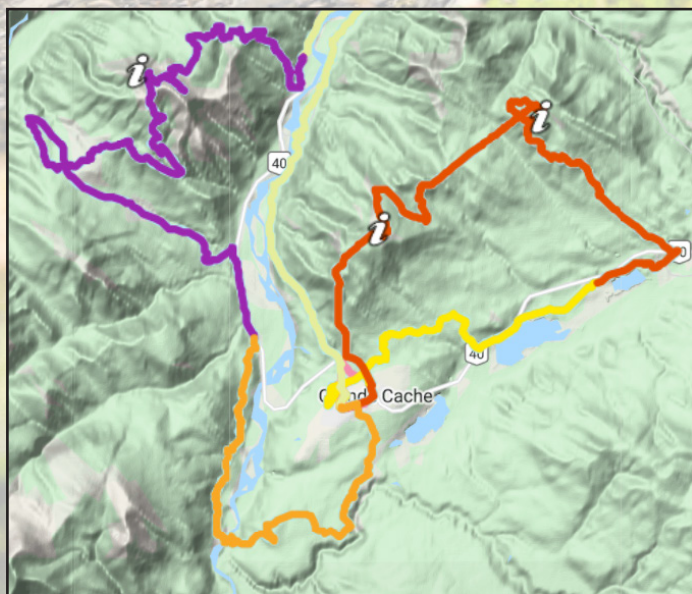

QUADDING & SNOWMOBILE TRAILS

Another great way to explore Grande Cache's countryside is by ATV or snowmobile. There are many options to explore cutlines, old logging roads, and alpine trails outside the Willmore Wilderness Park borders. Terrain is varied throughout the region's remote areas from easy to extremely challenging. Due to the nature of the activity and secluded locations, it is wise to carry extra supplies, including first aid in the event of an emergency. For additional information, visit aep.alberta.ca OR albertatrailnet.com.

Motorized vehicles are **NOT permitted** within the Willmore Wilderness Park boundaries, Sulphur Gates Provincial Recreation Area, or any provincial campgrounds.

Grande Mountain

Drive south of Grande Cache on Hwy 40 for approximately 6 km. The access road is located on the left side of the Hwy opposite to the sign that reads "Carconte Creek." Parking is permitted just off the Hwy or continue approximately 100 m up the road (if you are equipped with a high wheel-based vehicle), where you will find a large clearing up the right branch ideal for parking.

Flood Mountain

Look for a narrow dirt road on the left approximately 10 km south of Grande Cache on Hwy 40, just before the railway line overpass by Susa Creek settlement. Exercise extreme caution when turning off the Hwy.

Huckleberry Tower

Turn left onto Goodwin Road approximately 42 km south of Grande Cache on Hwy 40. Head 35 km up the road until you reach the tower. Alternatively, you can explore the numerous cutlines along this old Forestry Trunk Road.

Hoff Siding

Head south of Grande Cache on Hwy 40 for approximately 42 km. Turn right, opposite the Goodwin Road and continue approximately 5 km to the main cutline. This will lead you about 18 km to the Willmore Wilderness Park boundary. Alternatively, you can explore the numerous cutlines along the way. No motorized vehicles are permitted within the park; **PLEASE BE SURE NOT TO CROSS THE BOUNDARY.**

A-La-Peche Lake

Turn right approximately 32 km south of Grande Cache on Hwy 40, opposite of Pierre Grey's Lakes Provincial Area and then turn off to the left. This trail will lead you approximately 24 km over varying terrain and a river crossing before approaching the Forestry cabin. The lake is located 1 km further up from the cabin. There are many cutlines to explore in the area that borders the Willmore Wilderness boundary. **PLEASE DO NOT ENTER THE PARK BOUNDARY** as motorized vehicles are prohibited.

Beaverdam Road

Drive approximately 8.1 km north of Grande Cache on Hwy 40 and turn left onto Beaverdam Road. The road crosses coal mine property so ensure that you are staying on the Beaverdam Road. Along the road you will find several routes to explore.

Mt Hamell:

This route is for experienced riders only! An incredibly steep, narrow trail with many sharp drop-off sections. Riding up to the Mount Hamell lookout is not recommended.

Caw Ridge:

Head approximately 30 km to the Caw Ridge turn on the left. This old road will lead you approximately 8 km up the mountainside until you reach the top. Please stay on the trail and respect the fragile surrounding alpine environment.

Copton or Porcupine Airstrip:

40 km up the Beaverdam Road will lead you to the Copton area. Continue an additional 40 km to reach the Porcupine Airstrip.

Brinkerhoff

Head north on Hwy 40 from Grande Cache, approximately 30 km, slightly past Sheep Creek. Access the route from the gravel pit located off the Hwy. Continue for approximately 37 km. You can access Prairie Creek Meadows from here or explore the numerous cutlines in the area. This area borders private coal mine property so please ensure that you stay outside the mine boundaries.

Rules & Regulations

Any ATV over 50 cc's must be licensed and registered for use in Alberta. Use is permitted within the boundaries of the hamlet only to gain access to trails located outside of the hamlet boundaries. The shortest route available must be taken using back lanes and periphery trails.

Maximum speed within the hamlet boundaries must not exceed 20 km/hr. Use a gas can and fuel your ATV at home before starting your route.

White Water Rivers

From calm to down-right crazy, Grande Cache has a wide selection of whitewater, and rafting is one of the main reasons tourists come to town. For recreational paddlers, the Sulphur and Smoky Rivers are the most popular runs. In particular, the Sulphur River is a shuttle dream-come-true; the put-in and take-out are both only 4 km from Grande Cache, yet there are 17 kms of spectacular mountain scenery and two rivers of paddling in between. Rivers range from class 1 to 5, with a couple of good play spots. You can paddle for just an hour, a half day, a full day or even overnight.

Smoky River

Class 1/2
12 ft/mile, 16 km

Put-in: Smoky River Blue Bridge. Mostly a gentle class 1 run, one significant rapid above train bridge. Great play spot, also accessible from Hwy 40.
Take-out: Sheep Creek Campground or at play spot.

Sulphur River

Class 2/3
55 ft/mile, 17 km

Put-in: Downstream of Firemen's Park: turn right just before fenced area onto small road, take 2nd left. Park at 1st clearing. Technical run with some hazards that should be scouted.
Take-out: Blue Bridge

Muskeg River

Class 2/3
31.5 ft/mile, 2 km

Put-in: Muskeg River bridge, also a great playspot here. Don't miss take-out as a class 5+ and class 6 falls is next.
Take-out: Mason Creek day use area.

Kakwa River

Class 3/4
50 ft/mile 100 km

Put-in: Bridge crossing Kakwa on HWY 40. Significant series of ledges about 2 hours in, scouting required! Also, where the Cutbank River feeds in can be too big in high water.
Take-out: Canfor Flats Campground.

Sheep Creek

Class 4/5
80 ft/mile, 30 km

Put-in: Beaverdam Road. Very technical run, with frequent log jams & undercuts. One class 6 to portage. Scouting required. Solid class 4+ paddle skills required.
Take-out: Sheep Creek Camp Ground.

Snowshoeing

Snowshoeing in and around Grande Cache is weather dependent. When heading out on any trails or following along creeks in the winter, exercise extreme caution and ensure that risk of thin ice and avalanche conditions are not evident before heading out. If conditions turn or are not ideal at any point, turn back as your safety is more important. If conditions are safe, feel free to explore the area. Winter in and around Grande Cache is magical, and you won't be disappointed.

Tobogganing

There are two favourite toboggan hills in Grande Cache: **Anty's Hill** and the **Toboggan Hill**. Anty's Hill is located at

the intersection of 97 Avenue and Hoppe Avenue and is the smaller of the two hills. Toboggan Hill is located at 105 Street and 105 Avenue and is the larger of the two toboggan hills within the hamlet.

Pierre Grey's Lakes Recreation Area

Approximately 15 km of classic skiing tracks are set throughout the forested loops of Pierre Grey's Lakes. Trails range from beginner to advanced, ideal for any skill level. There is a warm-up shack, picnic tables, and a small toboggan hill located in the McDonald Day Use Area for those looking for alternative activities. Pierre Grey's Lakes is located 32 km south of Grande Cache on Hwy 40.

Cross Country Skiing

Groomed trails are set regularly by the dedicated volunteers of the Smoky River Nordic Ski Club in three different locations: the Grande Cache Municipal Campground, the Grande Cache Golf Course and Pierre Grey's Lakes. Cross country skis can be rented from the Grande Cache Tourism & Interpretive Centre.

The trails connect the **Grande Cache Campground and the Grande Cache Golf Course**. In addition, a 1 km track at the Grande Cache Golf Course is lit to offer night skiing for those who wish to do so. Exercise caution when out on the trails as unsafe conditions and unexpected wildlife can present themselves.

Part of the campground is lit to provide 1 km of night skiing. The total combined distance for the campground and golf course trails is about 10 km. Watch for signs of elk or deer, which sometimes bed down on the golf course. See Grande Cache Trails Map or TrailForks.

Outdoor Skating

Weather dependent, there are several options for outdoor ice skating. You will find an outdoor rink in phase 5 residential area, the Power Pond (located across from Victor Lake Turn off) and at Grande Cache Lake. Use extreme caution and consider conditions and ice thickness before heading out on any bodies of water during the winter months.

HISTORICAL DRIVING TOUR

Start at the Grande Cache Tourism and Interpretive Centre and pick up the “One Day Driving Tour” brochure. There is also an excellent historical display in the Centre, featuring pre-contact Aboriginal exhibits, fur trade information, local industry, natural history and more. You might even want to stretch your legs on the Bird’s Eye View Interpretive Trail, located at the Centre.



Stop #1: The Mine Prep Plant and ATCO Electric Plant (presently CST Coal)

McIntyre Porcupine Mines started the mine in 1969. People had known about the high quality metallurgical coal for years, but it was not until 1969 that a road and a railroad were constructed, so that the coal could be exploited.

Stop #2: Sulphur Gates

The Sulphur Gates are part of a geological formation known as the Cadomin Formation. This formation is important to geologists because it indicates the presence of coal.

Across the Smoky River, you will notice a river flowing into the Smoky. The Sulphur River got its name from the sulphur springs, located upstream. It is these springs that give the Sulphur its distinctive colour. The Aboriginal people gave the Smoky River its name because lightning would sometimes ignite the exposed coal seams along the river bank, causing them to emit smoke.

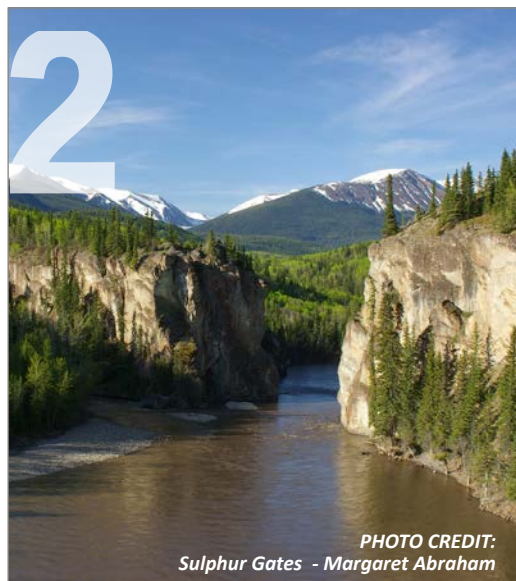

Stop #3: Grande Cache

Grande Cache got its name from an Iroquois fur trader named Ignace Giasson who cached a large supply of fur in the area during one of the winters between 1818 and 1821.

Stop #4: Victor Lake

The old airstrip, that was used by Forestry for years to fight fires in the region before there was a road. It was also used by McIntyre Mines when they were exploring for the mine site in the late 1960s and by the Town until our new airport (now closed) was constructed.

Stop #5: Grande Cache Lake

This is the site of the ancient Aboriginal camp. In the 1960s, there was extensive archaeological work done on the site. The Aboriginal people have inhabited the local area for about 10,000 years. Many artifacts were found on the site.

Stop #6: Susa Creek

You will see the Susa Creek graveyard. It is typical of the local Aboriginal graveyards in that there are spirit houses in it. You will also notice two churches. Both are named Our Lady of the Rockies. The old log church was built in 1964. It is now used for storage. The newer, white church was built to serve the Muskeg Co-op in 1958 and moved to Susa Creek in 1975. Please remember that this Co-op is private property.



Stop #7: Muskeg River Graveyard

This tiny graveyard is there because this was a popular stopping spot for the local Aboriginal people going between the communities of Susa Creek and Muskeg. Please be respectful of the site and neighbouring community.

Stop #8: Muskeg

It is not known exactly when the Muskeg trading post was first constructed, but we know that Emma Nickerson of Hinton ran it in 1929. It went through a number of owners before being closed down in the late 1970s. Eventually the buildings were torn down. Just up the road is the Muskeg Co-op, which of course, is private land.



Stop #9: The Pierre Grey Trading Post

Pierre Grey, whose real name was Pierre Gris, was a Metis from Isle Lake. He ran a fur trade post at this site in the 1800s. He did very well here, as he was married to a Delorme from the area, so the people trusted him and traded with him. You can spend the rest of your day at Pierre Grey enjoying a picnic, hiking the many trails, fishing for rainbows and brookies (yes, they can be caught from the shore), watching the wildlife, or just relaxing.

History & Culture

MD of Greenview

Explore the tourism, heritage centres and museums across Greenview.

Open seasonally, the **Greenview - Valleyview & Area Tourist Information Centre** is a great stop to learn more about your visit along Highway 43 and area. Valleyview hosts an annual fair and rodeo every summer featuring great entertainment for all who attend.

The DeBolt and District Pioneer Museum offers a collection of heritage buildings. They hold an annual Heritage Festival each August featuring a parade, fair, and activities. Make sure to stop at the Crooked Creek General Store along the way. They offer local products, and are famous for the best donuts and cinnamon buns around!

The Pioneers of Grovedale Area Museum promotes the history of the area and celebrates the perseverance and hard work of its pioneers through its homemaking, farming, ranching, forestry and rural living displays.

The Grande Cache Tourism & Interpretive Centre showcases the history of the area through exhibits and displays featuring ice age artifacts, dinosaur tracks, Aboriginal heritage and fur trading. Open year-round, the centre also has an outdoor interpretive park. Grande Cache hosts the annual Canadian Death Race every August long weekend, bringing in racers and visitors from all over the world, as elite runners tackle 118 km of rugged mountain terrain within 24 hours.

The Sturgeon Lake Cree Nation, Aseniwuche Winewak Nation, and Mountain Metis are all within Greenview's borders, contributing to our strong cultural background.

Hamlet of Grande Cache

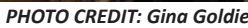
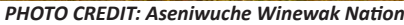
Alexander Mackenzie and David Thompson are heroes in Canada's history. These men were guided by Métis and Indian guides in the early 1800s, many from Kahnawake, Quebec. Northwest Company and Hudson Bay managers came from Scotland, and travelled with Métis guides risking everything to push westward. In 1819 the Hudson's Bay Company built St. Mary's House at the confluence of the Smoky and Peace Rivers. In December 1819, **Ignace Giasson** took charge of a push up the Smoky River, and hired **Tête Jaune**, a freeman by the name of **Pierre Bostonnais**. He was a Métis with blonde hair, earning him the nickname 'Yellowhead.' **Tête Jaune** guided the packtrain of horses up the Smoky River in 1820, in search of a new route through the Rockies. They left a large cache of furs on the Smoky River, where Grande Cache gets its name—french for "large cache."

In the 1950's, geological exploration discovered high-grade metallurgical "coking coal" in the area. In 1969, **McIntyre-Porcupine** started a coal mine, which fostered the construction of the "New Town of Grande Cache" in response to resource development. In 1980, a sawmill was constructed by **British Columbia Forest Products Ltd.**, which was sold to **Procter and Gable Cellulose Ltd.** in 1990. A Provincial Correctional Centre was built in 1984 to handle medium security inmates in Grande Cache. In 1988, the Alberta Government opened Highway 40 from Grande Cache to Grande Prairie.

On January 1, 2019, the Town of Grande Cache officially became a hamlet in the MD of Greenview.



The Aseniwuche Winewak, Cree for “Rocky Mountain People,” are a distinct Indigenous community located in the eastern slopes of the Rocky Mountains in what is now Grande Cache, Alberta. The Aseniwuche Winewak have been inhabiting and working the land since the 1700s, with archeological evidence dating occupancy back 10,000 years.

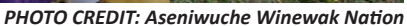


In 1907, Indigenous families living in the Jasper Valley were forced out following the establishment of the National Park. Some of these families made the long journey to the present-day Grande Cache area to join relatives already settled there.

In the 1960s, the discovery of coal triggered a chain of new developments that led to the establishment of the Town of Grande Cache in 1969. New Euro-Canadian ways challenged the Aseniwuche Winewak traditional way of life, and the social, environmental and economic impacts continue to be felt today. In 1994, the nonprofit society Aseniwuche Winewak Nation was formed as the representative body for individual members, providing services and programs for community and for greater representation and autonomy with relationship to government and corporate interests.



Today, the Aseniwuche Winewak number over 500 members with a shared geographical, lingual, and ancestral heritage. Most members live in Grande Cache or within one of seven parcels of land allocated to Aseniwuche Winewak in 1974 through Land Settlement Agreements with the Province of Alberta under the Cooperative Association Act.



Today many AWN members speak Cree and continue what is labelled as nehiyaw pimâtisiwin (ᐃᓴᐱᓂᑦᐸᓄᑦ), or Cree traditional way of life. Elders within the community describe it as the people’s “relationship to the land; a foundation of our identity,” strongly based on ancestral seasonal round land use, commercial trade, as well as cultural and spiritual teachings. The Nation’s ancestral roots in the region are deep. The AAWN have a demonstrably long history of people with an inexorable link to the land, nature, and philosophies of their shared community.

Mountain Metis

Otipemisiwak - Freeman

The Mountain Metis are descendants of predominantly Iroquois and European fur traders who traveled west with the Northwest Company and Hudson's Bay Company during the mid-18th century. Mountain Metis families were integral to the opening of the Canadian Rockies. The men were voyageurs and guides for famous early explorers. The women were the backbone of the mountain way of life, proficient in gathering food and medicines, beading, and tanning hides.

These fur trader families settled in the Athabasca Valley and homesteaded the region for over a century until the Jasper Exodus. In the early 1900's, an Order in Council was passed by the Federal government to create Jasper National Park. These families were forcefully evicted from their homes by government officials who sealed their guns, leaving them with no means of survival. They eventually resettled in other areas including Edson, Robb, Hinton, and Grande Cache and area, Co-Ops and Enterprises.



The Mountain Metis Community Association

Today, the Mountain Metis Community Association members continue their close connection with the land and follow traditional practices such as hunting, trapping, fishing, and gathering of plant medicines and berries. They are known as the horseback people who guide and outfit in the Canadian Rockies, as did their ancestors.



Established in 1994, the Mountain Metis Community Association (MMCA) is a non-for-profit community organization, serving historically connected descendants who previously resided in what is now Jasper National Park in the 19th century. The Mountain Metis Community Association's mission is to enhance the cultural, social, and economic well-being of their community. The MMCA works to improve the quality of life for Mountain Metis Community Association members by providing youth programs, access to historical and cultural information, land, and resource consultation, and hosting cultural events. Programs and activities are also available to non-members and the non-Indigenous community. The Mountain Metis Community Association values consist of preserving and honoring their historical and traditional sites, serving their community, integrity and accountability in their work, and protection and conservation of the environment and their traditional lands.

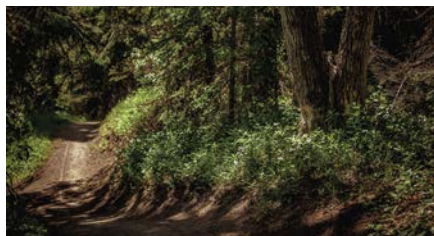

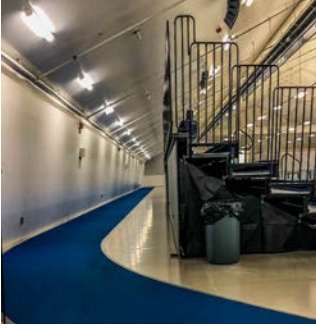

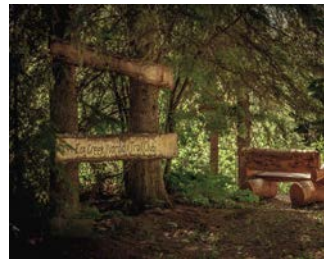
Fox Creek Nordic Trail: Terra Gravity Bike Park

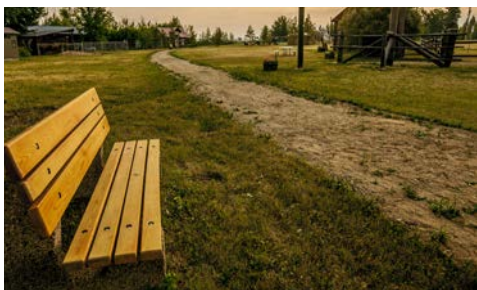
Around Greenview

DeBolt has approximately 1.5 km of walking trails within the Hamlet of DeBolt. Primarily located around the Sports Field.



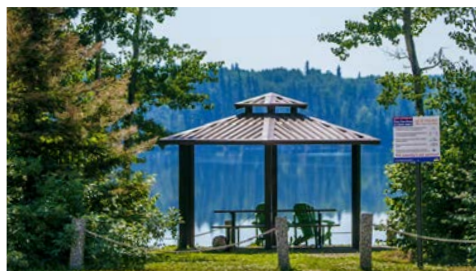
Sweathouse is a community located 145 km east of Grande Prairie on Highway 747 with a Community Centre and playground.

There are dozens of festivals and events throughout the year in Greenview, celebrating our active communities with athletic events, music festivals, rodeos, fairs, and more. Our well-connected Indigenous communities continue to celebrate and share their extended heritage within Greenview with various events throughout the year.

The Canadian Death Race, one of the world's toughest ultra-marathons held annually in Grande Cache on August long weekend. The 118 km course begins and ends on a 4200-foot plateau, passes over three mountain summits, and includes over 17,000 feet of elevation change and a major river crossing. Each year, extreme athletes push themselves to the limits of their endurance against the breathtaking background of the Canadian Rocky Mountains.

Growing the North Conference, the largest economic development conference in the Peace Region and one of the largest in Alberta.

Cranberry Lake Rodeo, held annually in June at the rodeo grounds south of DeBolt.

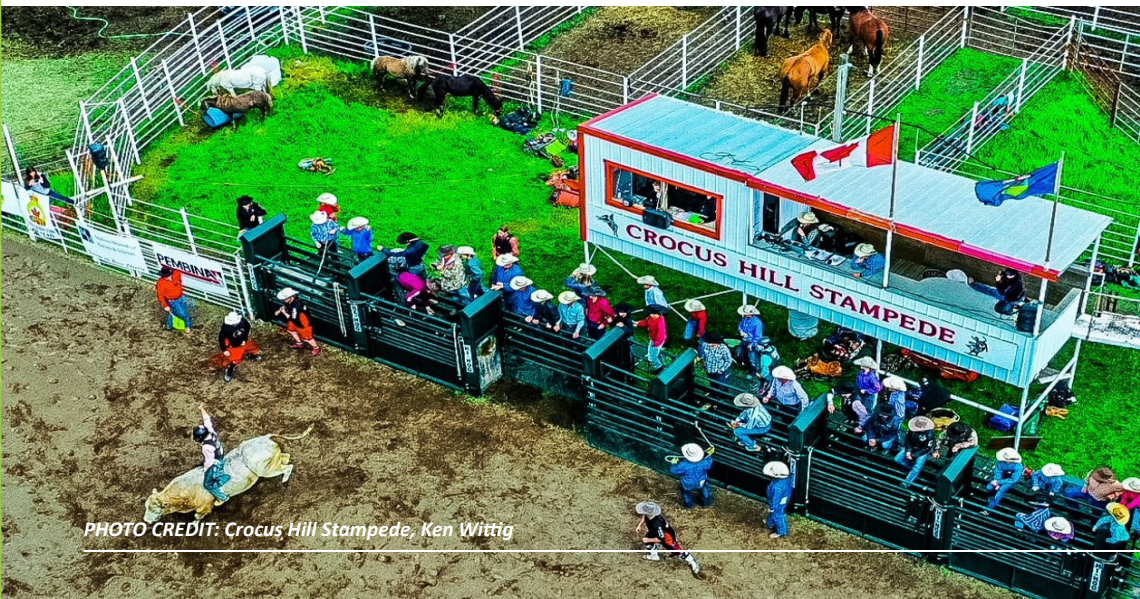
