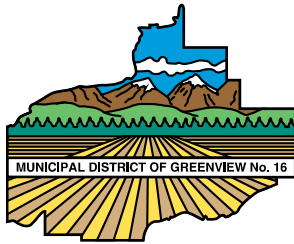

BYLAW NO. 21-873 of the Municipal District of Greenview No. 16

A Bylaw of the Municipal District of Greenview No. 16, in the Province of Alberta for the purpose of establishing rates and fees for the provision of goods and services, or on behalf of Greenview, as attached to this bylaw as the Schedules of Fees.

Whereas, pursuant to Section 7 and 8 of the Municipal Government Act R.S.A 2000, Chapter M-26 as amended, the Planning Act, Chapter P-9, R.S.A. and amendments thereto, and the Taxation Act, Chapter M-31, R.S.A. and amendments thereto, a municipal Council has the authority to pass a bylaw establishing fees for the provision of services; and

Whereas, The Council of the Municipal District of Greenview No. 16, duly assembled deems it expedient to revise the Schedules of Fees for the Municipality;

Therefore, the Council of the Municipal District of Greenview No. 16, duly assembled enacts as follows:

1. Title

1.1 This bylaw may be cited as the “Schedules of Fees Bylaw”.

2. Definitions

2.1 **Greenview** means the Municipal District of Greenview No. 16.

3. Application

3.1 This Bylaw establishes the rates, fees and charges for certain goods and services provided by Greenview.

3.2 This Bylaw and the attached Schedules will be reviewed as required and amendments to any of the rates and fees must be made by Council bylaw in accordance with Section 191(1) of the Municipal Government Act.

3.3 All fees, fines, rates, and penalties provided for in other current bylaws shall remain in full force and effect and may be charged in addition to the provisions stated in this Bylaw.

4. Rates and fees

BACKGROUND/PROPOSAL:

On November 30th, the Provincial Agricultural Service Board released a blog detailing the current state of the second round of stakeholder consultation of the Extended Responsibility Program (ERP), ending December 15th. The end goal of this consultation is to set out a permanent framework for recycling plastics in Alberta. Currently, agricultural plastics are not included within the framework.

With the announced closing of the Swan Hills Waste Treatment Plant (SUEZ), the closing of plastic recycling facilities in Asia to North American waste, and the transportation disadvantage within the Peace Region, and the end of the provincial agricultural plastic recycling pilot ending in April 2022, there are few end-of-life options on agricultural plastics other than municipally funded programs.

Administration had been planning to launch an Agricultural Plastics Recycling program in early 2022 as part of the provincial pilot but was advised by CleanFarms to postpone until August in hopes of a permanent program being in place.

The secondary stakeholder consultations end on December 15th.

BENEFITS OF THE RECOMMENDED ACTION:

The benefit of the recommended action is that the Board will be informed as to delays in launching the Agricultural Plastics Recycling Program.

ASB Participation in Agriculture Plastics Recycling

The ASBs have been active advocates for a permanent agriculture plastics recycling program and have passed many provincial resolutions on this topic.

Recently the government of Alberta announced their plans to build a circular economy for single use plastics and paper by introducing legislation that opens the door for what is called an Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) framework. Details about the province's announcements and engagement on the EPR can be found in the previous blog post "[Alberta Announces Extended Producer Responsibility Framework Impacting Plastics Recycling](#)"

Many provinces have been moving ahead with creating permanent recycling programs for agriculture plastics. Manitoba's EPR framework requires manufacturers to collect and recycle grain bags, baler twine and pesticide and fertilizer containers. Saskatchewan was the first province to establish an EPR for grain bags and in 2020 was able to recycle over 2500 tonnes of grain bags. The [October 2021 edition of the Ag Forward newsletter](#) published by CleanFarms who is the operator of Alberta's Agriculture Plastics Recycle pilot, contains an excellent article about EPRs and how they can benefit a permanent recycle program.

Discussions with the ASBPC and the Deputy Minister of Agriculture indicated that there is a reluctance to include agriculture plastics in the announced EPR without hearing directly from farmers. The ministry of Agriculture, Forestry and Rural Economic Development staff are reaching out to Alberta Environment and Parks to see what kind of engagement they require so we expect to hear more in the coming months.

In the mean time the Agriculture Plastics Recycling Group will be meeting with newly appointed Minister of Agriculture, Forestry and Rural Economic Development Nate Horner this week to discuss the issue and clarify steps forward. The [Agriculture Plastics Recycling Group](#) pilot project wraps up this spring.

Further Information:

- Between October 2018 and September 2021, the Agriculture Plastics Recycling Pilot collected 1,530,316 kg of grain bags and twine at 32 collection sites throughout the province.
- There are now two ag plastics recycling facilities in Alberta. [PolyAg Recycling Ltd.](#) in Bashaw, and Merlin Plastics near Hussar, making Alberta home to two of the three North American facilities that recycle grain bags.
- Manitoba and Saskatchewan already have a permanent programs for recycling grain bags.

Alberta Announces Extended Producer Responsibility Framework impacting Plastic Recycling

No current resolutions on Agriculture Plastic Recycling.

This spring, the Alberta government announced its intention to pursue a "circular economy approach" to waste management through the development of "an extended producer responsibility (EPR) program that will reduce volume in our landfills and diversify the economy. Under this approach, the cost and management of recycling shifts from municipalities and municipal taxpayers to those directly producing and consuming goods, encouraging companies to produce less waste and packaging and come up with innovative ways to recycle more materials." [Alberta.ca news release March 17, 2021](#) Both the RMA and AUMA are quoted as supporting this decision.

Under this approach, the industry funds the recycle programs, and decides if they will pass on the added costs to the consumers. "In other jurisdictions, there have been no additional consumer fees for packaging materials and Alberta consumers may already benefit from extended producer responsibility programs because product pricing is done nationally." A public online survey was opened until April 30 to gather feedback on this approach, the results of which are published in the [What We Heard: Extended Producer Responsibility Engagement](#).

On November 15, the government announced their intention to pass the " *Environmental Protection and Enhancement Amendment Act (that)* would set the foundation for Alberta's government to implement an extended producer responsibility (EPR) framework in 2022." The announcement goes on to say that the EPR Framework would contribute to the Alberta economy through the development of a recycling industry, align Alberta with other jurisdictions and "achieve one of the goals outlined in the Natural Gas Vision and Strategy for Alberta to become a North American centre of excellence for plastics diversion and recycling by 2030." [Alberta.ca news release November 15, 2021](#)

Phase two of the [Extended Producer Responsibility Engagement](#) is underway and open until December 15, 2021.

October 2021 the Agriculture Plastics Recycling Group published an article "[Managing Ag Plastics Long term - Can Product Suppliers Play a Bigger Role?](#)" outlining their position on including agriculture plastics in the EPR and the need for a stable recycling option in Alberta.

The replacement pull-blade arrived at the Agricultural Service yard on November 25th. Insurance has been arranged, and a unit number has been assigned.

Conversations with CleanFarms revealed that the Provincial Government is interested in hearing from impacted stakeholders regarding establishing a permanent Agricultural Plastics Recycling Program. CleanFarms encouraged letters to the Ministry to be written in support of a permanent program. They advised that Greenview postpone the launch of the Agricultural Plastics Recycling program as the current pilot ends in April 2022, and agricultural plastics have been left off the Extended Producers Responsibility (EPR) program. Administration has drafted a letter to send to the Provincial Government, should attempts to organize a Peace Region driven letter be unsuccessful.

The annual VSI contract extension arrived with a contract total of \$122,000. With Big Lakes County leaving the membership, administrative costs increased, resulting in a \$4,000 jump in Greenview annual totals. 4th quarter actuals will determine how accurate the 2022 VSI requisition projection will be. Adjustments have been made to the projection model to account for the increased administrative costs in future budget years.

Administration received the annual Alberta Crop Insect Update. Of note, forecasts indicate strong flea beetle pressures in 2022, with producers responding with seed bookings featuring effective seed treatments.

Rental Equipment stands at 584 rental days for 2021.

Up to December 1st, 60 wolves have been submitted for incentive, totalling \$18,000, and 456 beavers have been submitted for incentive, totalling \$13,680.

In view of the recent municipal elections, the board of VSI Services (1980) Ltd thought it advisable to (re-) introduce VSI Services (1980) Ltd to the current leaders of the municipal entities connected to it.

VSI stands for Veterinary Services Incorporated, a not-for-profit program, started in the Peace River district in July of 1970 with the primary intent of encouraging the development of veterinary practices in the Peace River District. The biggest need then was based on low cattle prices, making the economics of a large animal practice not very encouraging, resulting in low veterinary services offered. Over the years the program has grown from 7 participating municipalities and 2 veterinarians at start up to up to 16 municipalities and 74 veterinarians involved with the program. It provided support for veterinary services to four basic large animal species: cattle, swine, sheep and goats. Levels of coverage changed over time for the various municipalities. Some municipalities also adopted additional species into the mix, most often on a limited services covered.

But numbers do not tell everything. Lately the problem of large animal veterinarians' shortage has become more acute again. Large animal veterinarians are retiring after multiple years of service, moving out of the area, or the field of large animal practice. The newer generation of large animal practitioners has been somewhat harder to recruit for, with lifestyle, economics, and overall declining numbers interested in large animal practice all playing a role. This shortage of veterinarians is now no longer just regional, but provincial and national in scope, and includes all areas of veterinary practice.

At the same time the financial situation of different municipalities has changed as well, sometimes affecting levels of coverage that can be provided, or the introduction of services or financial caps to manage cost. In one instance it also resulted in the, hopefully temporary, withdrawal of one municipality from the program.

The combination of these trends could potentially negatively affect the VSI program moving forward. Reduction in support for VSI, leading to less economic support for the large animal producers, may in the short-term lead to a reduced request for veterinary services. This may then once again erode the economic basis for providing a year-round coverage for veterinary services, which is needed to be able to recruit young veterinarians interested in large animal practice to our areas. While some of the work is rather

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Dear MLA Long,

The Whitecourt Fish & Game Association (WFGA) wishes to address our concerns and opposition in respect to the proposed "Cervid Harvesting Preserves" and Game Farms in Alberta.

We understand the Alberta Elk Commission has established a Subcommittee to pursue the legalization of Cervid Harvesting Preserves (CHPs) in Alberta. They are lobbying the Government of Alberta to change legislation to allow this. They have been trying to implement this change for many years. Every time there is a new Government, they pursue this agenda. To date they have failed.

WFGA is a non-profit group which annually is composed of approximately 900 members. Our membership strongly supports the conservation and utilization of the Fish and Wildlife Resources in Alberta and in fact is concerned about all aspects of Canadas outdoors and outdoor pursuits.

WFGA is affiliated with the Alberta Fish and Game Association (AFGA) which represents approximately 24,000 members in over 80 clubs throughout Alberta and is the primary voice of Alberta's hunters and anglers. They have voiced their concern and opposition to Game Farms and the proposed Cervid Harvesting Preserves in Alberta. WFGA supports the AFGA in their opposition to Game Farms and Cervid Harvesting Preserves in Alberta.

There was substantial opposition at the time Cervid (Elk and Deer) Game Farms were established in Alberta in the 1980s and that opposition continues to this day. There was great concern about disease and parasites in these captive animals especially in relation to the possibility of these diseases and parasites being transmitted to wild animals or to other domestic breeds of livestock.. There were and continue to be other concerns as well:

- Non reporting or not reporting within required timelines of sick or dead animals.
- Noncompliance with other required rules and regulations associated with Game Farming

- Unlawful procuring of deer and elk from the wild.
- Unlawful trafficking in animals and their parts.
- Captive elk and deer escaping to the wild and problems associated with recapture.
- inadequate enforcement (Fish and Wildlife Officers are no longer doing compliance enforcement and investigations.)

In December of 1990 the first case of tuberculosis was discovered in Game Farmed elk in southern Alberta.

In March 2002 the first case of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) was found in Game Farmed Elk approximately 30 km from Whitecourt.

In November of the same year (2002), the first case of CWD was found in an Alberta Game Farmed Whitetail Deer. Many more cases of CWD in Game Farmed deer and elk have occurred since then.

It is important to note that in most cases when these diseases were/are discovered in these Game Farms, all the elk or deer on these farms were/are destroyed. We believe this is still the practice today. In addition, the game farmer was/is fully compensated for all the animals killed. Taxpayers' pay the compensation. It is difficult to understand why the Game Farmers are not required to have adequate insurance to compensate for their losses. Many millions of dollars have been paid to Alberta Game Farmers in compensation since the inception of Game Farms all at the taxpayers' expense.

We believe the introduction of CWD to our wild populations of elk and deer is directly a result of the establishment of Game farming of these animals in Alberta.

The first case of CWD in wild deer was discovered in 2005. Since then, the total number of CWD infected deer tested is more than 3000. That number will continue to rise and the area in which the disease is found will continue to increase.

We believe Game Farms continue to pose a risk to wild ungulate populations. There is something ethically wrong about treating these animals as livestock. They deserve to retain their wild designation. The WFGA is strongly opposed to Game Farming and is calling on the Alberta Government to eliminate game farms in Alberta.

The WFGA believes that hunting is an important part of our history and culture. It is a pursuit that helps us to connect to our past. It brings us closer to nature. It is satisfying to provide food to our families just as our ancestors have done. It is extremely important to us to hunt ethically and in a sportsmanlike way. You can take pride if you are fortunate enough to harvest an animal in this responsible manner. Hunting elk and deer in a penned enclosure does not represent any of the core values we have expressed. No matter how you dress it up you are hunting animals behind a fence. These animals cannot truly escape. The public today is scrutinizing hunting more than ever before. We believe that allowing Cervid Hunting Preserves will result in Public opposition to all hunting.

The WFGA is asking the Alberta Government to please consider the irreversible ecological and cultural damage that would result from "Cervid Harvest Preserves" and take our views into consideration and to do what is ethically right. Please eliminate Game Farms in Alberta and do not

allow the hunting of captive elk and deer.

We wish to voice our concern over the December 2020, Government of Canada release 'A Healthy Environment and a Healthy Economy' A plan which pledges to reduce emissions from fertilizer by 30% below 2020 levels. Agriculture production is key to our continued existence. With the growing demand for agricultural products for export as well as our own increasing population, it is prudent to take into consideration the recommendations put forward by Fertilizer Canada. Producing more food requires the use of fertilizers. *"Fertilizer Canada released a report suggesting a 30 percent reduction target could cost Canadian farmers as much as \$48 billion in lost revenue over the next eight years."*

Dear Mr. Kolodychuk:

Thank you for your October 18, 2021, letter regarding Agricultural Service Board (ASB) grant funding, and for sharing your concerns about the additional workload experienced by municipal agricultural fieldmen. ASBs are a critical partner for the Government of Alberta, and we remain committed to supporting the important work you do each year to implement and enforce the *Agricultural Service Board Act*, *Weed Control Act*, *Agricultural Pest Act*, *Soil Conservation Act*, and for assisting with the *Animal Health Act*. Municipalities and the province have had a strong relationship over the years, including Agriculture, Forestry and Rural Economic Development's 75-year partnership with ASBs.

As you know, the economic downturn and the onset of COVID-19 have led to significant reductions in government revenue. It put immense pressure on the budget and led to tough decisions about how we supported organizations and what services we could provide. As a result, the 2020-21 budget included a reduction in the overall ASB program budget, starting in spring 2020. Although the 2020-24 ASB program budget was reduced, the new five-year ASB Grant Program agreement is intended to provide increased program stability and ensure annual program payments will be processed quickly. I understand the grant reduction has put pressure on municipal budgets. Unfortunately, due to the existing economic climate, Agriculture, Forestry and Rural Economic Development is not in a position to increase ASB grant amounts at this time.

I also understand that changes to ministry staff have led to shifting demands on the expertise and technical knowledge that agricultural fieldmen and other municipal staff provide. I appreciate the support that these professionals have supplied over the last year. To ensure we remain connected to ASBs and agricultural fieldmen, we have recently launched the new Regional ASB Liaison program. This program replaces the Key Contact program. The Regional Liaisons will link more informally with fieldmen and ASB members on a regular basis. In addition, an ASB-directed newsletter will be shared with ASBs on a quarterly basis, along with a town hall meeting to be held between ASB chairmen and Assistant Deputy Minister John Conrad twice per year. Engagement with ASBs on all three levels—newsletter, liaison, and through executive senior management—will support a strengthened relationship between the department and ASBs.

Thank you again for writing. The growth and success of Alberta's agriculture industry remains at the heart of the Government of Alberta's economic strategy, and ASBs will continue to be an important partner in that success.

INSECT SURVEY RESULTS – 2021 – GREENVIEW

2021 Summary

Thank you so much for managing two of these sites. This year we had eight bertha armyworm sites in Greenview and all had very low trap counts. It would seem the outbreak in the Peace is over, but trapping is still very important in 2022 to give us early warning of possible bertha issues in the current growing season.

No wheat midge in 2021; but producers and agronomists should be aware that wheat midge does exist in your area and given proper conditions like June rains and delayed seeding could cause a build up to damaging levels.

I did find pea leaf weevil feeding damage during my June visit. The levels are not of concern, but it is something that we need to pay attention to in the future.

One thing that we need to keep an eye on is the cutworm situation. With the long fall and crop regrowth, cutworm moths had the opportunity to lay a lot of eggs. Fields with bare spots should be checked for cutworms next spring.

And Dan Johnson mentioned that clearwing grasshopper numbers are building in the Peace, so we need to keep an eye on this situation in 2022.

BERTHA ARMYWORM (BAW)

Bertha armyworm is very cyclical. In order to catch outbreaks and help producers minimize losses it is necessary to maintain a good monitoring system using pheromone traps. The number of moths caught in the traps informs us of the risk of damaging populations with a 3 to 5 week lead time. These numbers are generated from paired pheromone traps in individual fields, except in the Peace River region where only 1 trap is used to reduce impact on native pollinators. These numbers are generated from a single pheromone trap in individual fields to reduce impact on native pollinators.

Bertha armyworm populations are normally kept in check by such factors as weather and natural enemies. Potential damage may be more or less severe than suggested by the moth count data depending on weather and crop conditions and localized population dynamics. Research has clearly shown that very few fields are ever affected in an area with moth catches less than 300. Even at higher moth counts field scouting is critical for pest management decisions because experience has shown that field to field and even within field variations can be very large.

PEA LEAF WEEVIL (PLW)

Experience has shown us that high numbers of pea leaf weevil adults in fall will likely mean significant infestation levels in the following spring. The timing and intensity of spring damage is strongly related to the onset of warm conditions (>20°C) for more than a few days in April or May. The earlier the weevils arrive in fields the higher yield loss potential. Extended cool weather delays weevil movement into the field. Yield impact is lower if the crop advances past the 6 node stage before the weevils arrive. The numbers represented here are generated from assessing feeding damage on 10 plants in 5 locations in a field.

WHEAT MIDGE (SOIL) (WM)

Wheat midge is an insect that increases in numbers in wet years. Numbers can vary drastically from field to field and we try to sample wheat adjacent to the previous years' wheat in order to pick up populations if they are present. There is no definitive way to know exactly the risk in any given field so field scouting when the wheat comes into head is critical. The numbers shown here give a general trend of midge populations. Individual fields will have a different risk.

These numbers are generated by taking soil samples from wheat fields after harvest using a standardized soil probe.

The risk level as shown on our maps is as follows:

- 0 midge will be displayed as light grey (No infestation)
- 2 or less midge will be shown as dark grey (<600/m²)
- 3 to 5 will be shown as yellow (600 to 1200/ m²)
- 6 to 8 will be shown as orange (1200 to 1800/ m²)
- 9 or more will be shown as red. (>1800/ m²)

Alberta Crop Insect Update 2021

SUMMARY

Lygus bugs were a major pest in canola through much of the province. Flea beetle numbers were high going into the fall and some control measures were used at the late pod stage to protect what yield was there. Diamondback moth and bertha armyworm were not an issue in 2021. Although not new, wheat stem sawfly damage was found as far north as highway 9 and the cutting damage in its traditional area is over 65%. New finds of the lily leaf beetle continue as it moves around the province. Spotted Wing Drosophila was detected at four localities in Alberta.

OILSEED INSECTS

Flea beetles were a major concern in canola throughout Alberta. A common comment from many agronomists and producers was that there were high numbers in late summer and fall. Some spraying of canola at late pod was done in the Falher and Eaglesham area of the Peace to protect yield as beetles were doing significant damage to the pods. Producers are gearing up for strong flea beetle pressure in 2022, booking canola seed with effective seed treatments.

Bertha armyworm moth (*Mamestra configurata*) was monitored at 337 locations in 2021. The population outbreak in the Peace seems to be on the decline. In 2021, only two of the 337 pheromone traps went over the first warning level of 300; but there was isolated spraying for this insect in central Alberta.

Diamondback moth (*Plutella xylostella*). Our monitoring system for diamondback moth has expanded to 41 sites. There was no major migration of this insect.

The cabbage seedpod weevil (*Ceutorhynchus obstrictus*) survey covered central and southern Alberta (excluding the Peace region which is coordinated by Jennifer Otani, AAFC Beaverlodge). The survey was conducted in 264 fields with an additional 38 on-line reports from agrologists. Results from the survey and online reporting indicated that cabbage seedpod weevil numbers were low in 2021 with the exception of some early-planted fields south of Fort McLeod and near Magrath that were over threshold and required insecticide treatment.

Lygus bugs were a concern as high numbers of the insect were found at podding. Producers and crop advisors struggled with the decision to control the pest in heat and drought stressed crops, debating whether to salvage every bushel or abandon failing crops. Hot and dry conditions in late spring allowed populations to explode and migrate to canola during flowering. Lygus during flower normally are less than 1 per sweep but some fields had 2-3 lygus per sweep during the 2021 flowering period. A nominal threshold of 2-3/sweep (work by Hector Carcamo, AAFC Lethbridge) replaced the older Lygus threshold charts when it became apparent that many regions of the prairies were finding high lygus numbers. Some growers sprayed at flower, but still had lygus over threshold at the pod stage.

Root maggots (*Delia* spp.) were not much of an issue in 2021. This insect is usually associated with moist growing conditions. Root examinations when scouting for clubroot found limited damage in 2021.

In August 2020, Diptera larvae found inside canola pods, were collected from a field in Wheatland County. Late in 2020, DNA analysis, done by the Alberta Plant Health Lab, identified these insects as *Contarinia brassicola*, the canola flower midge.

In mid-July 2021, nine fields within an eight-mile radius of the 2020 field were surveyed for the presence of the larvae in the pods. One field was found with larvae in pods, which were collected and sent to the Alberta Plant Health Lab and Mori Lab at University of Alberta for identification. Results confirmed *Contarinia brassicola*. A delineation survey in Wheatland county; northern edge of Vulcan county and the southern edge of Kneehill county was done under the direction of Dr. Boyd Mori. An additional 9 fields were found to have pods with infestation including two more fields reported by the Alan Mittelstadt, the agronomist who reported the original 2020 find.

CEREAL INSECTS

Wireworm (Elateridae) continues to be a difficult problem for many producers. While the serious problems continue in southern Alberta, reports of wireworm and wireworm issues are showing up further north each year. There is no monitoring program for wireworms, so we rely on communications from producers and agronomists. 2021 was the first growing season for a new insecticide seed treatment in cereals, it remains to be seen if recent new chemicals will reduce the wireworm problems in Alberta.

Wheat stem sawfly (*Cephus cinctus*). In 2021, 85 fields were surveyed for wheat stem sawfly. Sawfly numbers increased in 2021, in the southeast corner of AB, with fields well over 65% cutting. High levels of damage were observed at Lethbridge in AAFC farmland (Brian Beres' field observation). Sawfly cutting was found in nearly every field visited south of Highway 3. Damage at very low levels (<3%) was also found in Rocky View, Kneehill and Starland Counties. The 2021 summer heat and premature maturation of wheat will reduce the second generation of the key sawfly parasitoid, *Bracon cephi* going into winter.

Wheat midge (*Sitodiplosis mosellana*) processing of 285 fields is complete. Results from the survey and reports from producers and agronomists are indicating wheat midge was not an issue in 2021.

Wheat head armyworm (*Dargida diffusa*) was reported (and a cause of alarm when scouted for by using the combine header) from Strathmore north to Three Hills-Drumheller area. Cotesia wasp parasitism, indicated by pupal masses, was also reported. Producers and agronomists are asking about scouting and control measures.

A small survey (10 fields) for European corn borer (*Ostrinia nubilalis*) was done in Newell County. No larvae were found.

PULSE CROP INSECTS

Pea leaf weevil (*Sitona lineatus*) continues to be found over a wide range in 2021 but damage is lower than normal in traditional areas and did not expand its northern edge.

Three surveillance sites, Bow Island (Forty Mile County), Rainier and Tilley (Newell County) were set up for Western Bean Cutworm (*Striacosta albicosta*) and none were found.

Lentil growers are noticing significant feeding damage on lentil roots by wireworm. Lentil growers also had to contend with grasshoppers, many lentil fields were sprayed.

GRASS CROPS, PASTURES AND GENERAL INSECTS

Black grass bug (*Labops hesperius*) was of concern in the Municipal District of Foothills this spring in dry pastures.

The black army cutworm (*Actebia fennica*) was reported in alfalfa hay fields in the spring in Sturgeon County.

Lesser migratory grasshopper, *Melanoplus sanguinipes*, a pest of cereals and oilseeds, was low in density, and low in relative abundance across much of Alberta, and nearly absent in the area from Lethbridge to the USA and east to Saskatchewan. Lesser migratory grasshopper, like all of the pest species, increase in numbers locally when warm, dry spring and summer weather allow.

Two-striped grasshopper, *Melanoplus bivitattus*, increased in abundance in 2021 across southern Alberta, with hot spots of over 100 per square meter in areas near Carmangay, Skiff, Foremost, Lethbridge, and east to the Saskatchewan border. Variability also increased, hot spots were separated by large areas with no *Melanoplus bivitattus* to be found. The fungal disease, *E. grylli*, a common sight in some areas, killed thousands in southern Alberta in 2021. Two-striped grasshopper is expected to increase in numbers and range in 2022. Packard's grasshopper, remains much lower and more restricted to roadsides near grass and hay.

Clear-winged grasshopper increased density in southern Alberta, and in Peace River, but remain much lower in numbers than other dominant species. It seems that this species had a much greater rate of parasitism than other grasshoppers during 2018-2021 (up to 50% killed by internal maggots), and this natural control might be helping. This species is expected to increase in 2022.

Bruner's spur-throated grasshopper populations from Falher to Peace River, Manning and Keg River were significant but still not as high as a full outbreak.

European skipper (*Thymelicus lineola*) questions about effects of larval feeding on timothy and brome hay production are starting to circulate among producers in the Peace. Some are saying they are losing yield to this insect.

Horticulture

Two pheromone trap locations were set up in Brooks region for the invasive Japanese Beetle, *Popillia japonica*. Trap locations included the golf course and a private residence. No beetles were captured.

The Lily Beetle, *Lilioceris lili*, has continued its spread throughout the province with a distribution that ranges from Gibbons, Onoway and Bruderheim in the north-central to Leslieville and Cochrane in the west, to Vegreville, Drumheller, and Lloydminster in the east, and to Lethbridge and Brooks in the south.

Dutch Elm Disease (DED), *Ophiostoma novi-ulmi*, had been detected in the City of Lethbridge with two boulevard trees testing positive in 2020. Eradication was successful and it is considered as an isolated case. This is the second detection of the disease since a single tree had tested positive in 1998 in the Town of Wainwright. All 2021 DED suspect samples cultured at the Alberta Plant Health Lab tested negative for the fungus. Alberta continues to monitor annually for the DED beetle vectors throughout the province. In 2021, STOPDED commissioned Living Tree Environmental to conduct enhanced DED surveys in locations that captured higher, sustained numbers of elm bark beetles over the last 2 years to determine if DED was present. Locations surveyed were Town of Brooks, Taber, Oyen and Drumheller, Village of Diamond City, Consort, Cereal and Barons, Taber Municipal Park and Park Lake and Tillebrook Provincial Parks. Alberta is still DED free.

The Elm Seed Bug, *Arocatus melanocephalus*, was detected for the first time in Alberta in the Medicine Hat region. This insect feeds on the seeds of elm and is not considered a threat to the tree. However, it can be a nuisance due to its habit of entering homes in large numbers in the summer to avoid heat.

There is a tentative record of the Poplar Sawfly, *Trichiocampus grandis*, from Red Deer last summer and now this summer from Chestermere. Rearing was not successful from last year. Specimens will be collected next summer to confirm a western range extension.

In a survey of 6 localities in central and southern Alberta, Spotted Wing Drosophila (SWD), *Drosophila suzukii*, was detected at several localities (Olds, Edmonton, Lethbridge, and Lacombe).

Here are some thoughts about Canola flower midge and swede midge.

Swede midge has been monitored in AB with pheromone traps since 2006 by AAFC in Saskatoon and continued in 2021. Processing of 2021 is still happening, but swede midge has not been found on any trap (2006-2020) in Alberta and there are about 10 cooperators in the province.

Swede midge is found in Ontario in 2001 and is throughout eastern Canada, Ohio, Minnesota and the eastern seaboard.

- 2015 Scott and I did a survey looking for **swede midge** damage...but it was in august and was a bust
- 2016, I did survey looking for damage from what we thought was swede midge...but this was soon to be debunked as Boyd Mori, then with AAFC Saskatoon, collected and reared the animal, sent to a taxonomist in Ottawa and found that this animal was a totally different beast, (now known as canola flower midge *Contarinia brassicola*)
- 2017, Scott pulled together a team of about 8 people and we did intensive survey from hwy 12 to north of Bonnyville and as far west as sturgeon
 - We followed the north south highways from SK border and worked West. We stopped at a field every 20 km and counted damage on 100 racemes (10 stops 10 racemes)
 - Damage was collected and processed.
- 2018, we surveyed west side of province (foothills) and southern peace.
- 2019, was repeat of 2017 survey zone, with far less fields as it was just me and the summer student, with Scott evaluating fields while he was on the great grasshopper tour....
- 2020 was a repeat of 2019, I focused on the area from Vermilion south to Forestburg
- 2021, I didn't do a survey at all in the east of Edmonton zone as I wanted to chase and confirm the "larvae in the pod" in Wheatland County so that is where the resources (me) went.
- In 2022, I expect to survey again in the north east and also the Peace.

When we are surveying we have seen up to 25 buds affected on 1 raceme on one plant. but then you can look at 10 other racemes and find 1 or two buds affected. So on a canola plant, could this be a pest? Jurys still out.

So what we know...

In 2020 Canola flower midge larvae were found in the pods of canola in Wheatland county. So how did the midge, with a weak ovipositor breach the wall of the pod? Jury is out on that one, but she has to have a way to get into the pod. The working hypothesis was through a cabbage seedpod feeding hole or hail damage. BUT that does not explain how the larvae were found in the pods at Forestburg and Galahad in 2021, (very low if any numbers of cabbage seedpod weevil). So now the thought is that she might use the feeding holes of lygus bugs (not unprecedented as the brassica pod midge *Dasineura brassicae* in Europe gains access to the pod by using the turnip seed weevil puncture holes, made by its feeding and egg laying)

When feeding in pod the canola flower midge feeds on seeds. Interestingly, when scouting for this one in the field, the pods have an orange stripe on the top of the pod, otherwise the pod looks normal, followed by premature ripening. When you lightly squeeze the pod, it feels hollow where the seeds have been eaten

Even in the case where seeds in the pod are eaten, not all the seeds are consumed, so there is still yield coming from that pod...

As we stand now, we are not sure if this Canola flower midge can develop into a pest of canola.

It is interesting that it can inhabit 2 stages of the canola plant.

BUT there is some great research being done now in Alberta by Boyd Mori at the U of A. he is working on Pheromone testing and assessing damage. We are really lucky to have the scientist who named the insect in AB continuing his work.
