May 2022

The Community Volunteer Income Tax program volunteers wrapped up at the end of April. While taxes can be done throughout the year, most people access the service during March and April and in this time period 650 returns were filed between the two offices, bringing back \$3,272,988.00 into the community.

The Volunteer Appreciation dinners in Grovedale and Valleyview were a success. There were approximately forty people in Grovedale and one hundred attending in Valleyview. While there was not a dinner held in Grande Cache, we did receive over ninety nominations from the hamlet and each nominee was appreciated with a \$5.00 gift card to a coffee shop. In 2023, a volunteer appreciation dinner in Grande Cache will be a consideration.

Community Services administration traveled to Nose Creek on April 26. Through conversations with residents, administration is gauging the appetite for another community engagement session, or meet and greet, to take place this early summer. This opportunity is an ideal informal way to build relationships and hear any concerns the community may have.

In the last Managers report to council, it was mentioned that the Calgary Center for Sexuality has selected Green View FCSS to be a scaling site for the WiseGuyz program. WiseGuyz is an evidence-informed participatory program designed to promote healthy relationships and prevent adolescent dating violence. The program provides a safe space for participants to reflect on the impacts of harmful gender stereotypes and build essential relationship skills. These skills aim to promote healthy sexuality and relationship development while decreasing attitudes related to homophobia and gender-based violence. We are currently in conversations with Peace Wapiti School division, Northern Gateway School division, and Grande Yellowhead School division to roll out the program, either in school or community, in the fall of 2022.

The numbers of visits to the Community Resource Centers in the month of April averaged about 50 per day, with a total of 781 visits in April. The top reasons for attending are tax and employment related, as well as technical assistance.

The Mother-Daughter Circle was be offered in the month of May. The purpose of this program is to promote a healthy, sustainable bond between mother and daughter during the transitional years from girlhood to young womanhood. The program requires a minimum of 4 Mother-daughter pairs, and unfortunately only one pair signed up so the program will not run at this time.

Partnerships with protective services include an autism sticker that residents can put on the front door of their house alerting first responders that an individual with autism resides in the

home. The goal of this is to ensure first responders are sensitive to potential reactions of residents who are autistic. Stickers are available through the FCSS office and at all fire stations.

Emergency Social Services (ESS) basic training will be provided to all FCSS staff on May 11 through the Alberta Emergency Management Agency. To prepare for flood and fire season, the training will cover aim and scope; what emergency social services is; ESS planning and activation; immediate actions; ESS shelter operations; and re-entry and recovery operations.

Administration is working on the submission of the 2021 outcomes and financial reports to the province, which should be complete prior to the end of May.

Administration attended the Directors Network conference in Lethbridge from May 4-6, and the entire FCSS Board will be attending the Northwest Spring regional meeting in Grande Prairie on May 18 and 19th. Provincial updates with be provided at that time.

On a final good note, administration has signed a rent subsidy agreement with the Province of Alberta, which allows us to remain rent free in the Provincial Building in Grande Cache until 2025.

Assistant Manager Overview

Total of all individuals assisted in March & April: 1052

*This number is the sum of clients assisted by each department (Community Resource Coordinator, Home Support Coordinator, Outreach Coordinator, and Youth Coordinator)

As of April 4, 2022, Alberta Infrastructure reopened the Provincial Building, allowing FCSS clientele to resume walk-in services. This has allowed clients who have had difficulty accessing the office, because they did not have phones, to get the help they need.

We received 91 volunteer nominations. This number includes 14 individual nominations, 1 youth and 6 organizations. Each nominee received \$5.00 gift card for a local coffee shop. A survey of this years nominees shows 70% would attend an appreciation dinner (if available), 17% prefer the gift card, and 13% have no preference. Responses will be taken into consideration when planning Volunteer Appreciation in 2023.

The first stages of Wise Guyz implementation are underway. This includes marketing timelines and conversations with Aseniwuche Winewak Nation and Grande Yellowhead Public School Division. Promotion will start in June, engagement sessions with parents and male identified youth in the fall. The program will run immediately afterschool with the day of the week, location, and start date yet to be confirmed, but estimated start will be late September 2022.

Administration continues to collaborate with Grande Yellowhead Public School Division, Grande Cache Municipal Library, Mountain Metis Youth Connections, Grande Cache Visitors Information Centre and Grande Cache Recreation Centre on development of a summer program calendar. This summer will provide many opportunities for youth and will kick off with a summer program registration night in late June. The event, spearheaded by the Bringing Empowered Students Together coach, will include all partners in this collaborative group.

Creative Greif and Loss clientele increased this past month. 8 individuals are participating in a group and the remaining individuals receive one-on-one care. A client identified through her art project that she could see her progress in her grief relationship, noting how darkness in her art was no longer dominate. She is on her healing journey, having completed half of work.

The Home Support Coordinator has completed the COMPASS Caregiver training and this past month completed on boarding of a Home Support Worker.

Outreach Coordinator

Current active clients total 26 with average age of 50 years. Clients have been aided with forms completion, transportation, medication delivery and pre/post hospitalization assistance. Facilitating Boys Council and co-facilitating SAFE Spaces was conducted over the last couple of months as well.

Participants of Boys Council built relationships with one another. An example of the learning; one boy stated he did not like to show sadness because his friends will think less of him, another boy responded with, "It's okay, we all feel sad sometimes, I'm your friend and I won't think any less of you." The emotional growth seen in the participants was incredible to witness.

A highlight this month is the support being given to older adults during difficult periods of their life journey. One client, recently discharged from cancer treatments was assisted with senior benefits applications, navigation of resources for support, and signing up for the FCSS Home Support Program. Another client, with no family or friends in our community, transitioned from the lodge to continuing care in the hospital. Alberta Health Services Home Care requested FCSS support to lessen the client's anxiety and with our assistance have seen a notable improvement in the client's mood.

Youth Coordinator

SAFE Space (GSA) currently offered at the FCSS office will be partnering with Summitview Middle School starting in May. Combing the two GSAs will provide increased opportunities to develop supports with one another. The school welcomes the experience and support FCSS will be providing and look forward to our GSAs combining.

Girls Circle was successful. By the end of the program youth were respectfully and openly sharing how they feel. All three outcomes were achieved: increased self-esteem, teamwork, and getting along with others.

Body Talk is currently being provided to grade 5 students at the middle school and will run until the beginning of June. We are confident positive outcomes will be achieved.

Partnering with a local Elder and an Indigenous artist, Miyo Wichihitowin featured ribbon skirt knowledge learnings. Thirty minutes after advertising, the program filled a second session was added to eliminate a waiting list. Indigenous and non-indigenous youth came together and created their own ribbons skirts, a symbol of womanhood in indigenous culture and learned lessons of adaption and survival.

• Community Volunteer Income Tax Program (CVITP)

The CVITP program utilizes volunteers to prepare income tax and benefit returns for people with modest income and simple tax situations. During the tax months the program completed 576 returns. There have been 120 more returns done in 2022 than at this time in 2021.

GST (Good & Services Tax) **CCTB** (Child Tax Benefit), **CWB** (Canadian Workers Benefit), **GIS** (Guaranteed Income Support) are all federal programs that only pay out if the income tax return is filed on time.

*The Canada Child Tax Benefit (CCTB) is a tax-free monthly payment made to eligible families to help them with the cost of raising children under 18 years of age.

*The Canadian Workers Benefit (CWB) is a refundable tax credit intended to provide tax relief for eligible working low-income individuals and families who are already in the workforce and to encourage other Canadians to enter the workforce.

*The Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS) provides a monthly non-taxable benefit to Old Age Security (OAS) pension recipients who have a low income.

*The Federal Climate Action Incentive (CAI) payment consists of a basic amount and a 10% supplement for residents of small and rural communities. In 2022 this will be paid out in quarterly payment like the GST benefit.

Home Support

The Home Support program provides basic housekeeping, meal preparation, limited respite and transportation to medical appointments or other essential services. Currently there are 71 clients, 47 from the MD and 24 in Valleyview. In March and April transportation was provided 19 times for essential services.

The Home Support staff have been attending NorQuest College's online Caregiver Wellness Initiative workshops.

Effective Communication

- Identify and utilize strategies to comfortably take on the caregiver role at end-of-life.
- Explore how to meet the needs of the care recipient and caregiver.
- Discuss signs of approaching death and symptom management at end-of-life.
- Describe the impact that grief can have on a person.
- > Discuss culture and palliative care.
- > Explore communication in palliative care.

Navigating the Healthcare System

- Examine the Alberta Health Services' care system
- Explore differences between care facilities within the healthcare system
- Examine the different caregiver roles and determine their functions within the healthcare system including the role of family caregiver
- Summarize steps to take to plan for care needs and preparing for healthcare appointments
- Discuss and implement CSNAT (Carer Support Needs Assessment Tool) approach and how it is used to determine specific supports for caregivers
- Outline resources available to support caregivers and how to access them

• Balance- Restorative Yoga

Balance is a restorative yoga program. This program is a support (chair) based yoga designed to restore or improve flexibility, strength, and balance.

In DeBolt, Balance started on Jan 25^{th,} and ran once a week.

In Valleyview, Balance ran twice a week for 5 weeks. 100 % of the respondents reported that the Balance Program has contributed to their ability to remain in their home. 100% of respondents reported that the Balance Program has helped them believe that they have the ability to improve their life.

• Adult Support and Referral

The Support and Referral Program supports clientele in multiple ways. Clients are supported by finding appropriate programs or assisting with applications and or advocacy. The majority of staff time is spent assisting people with caregiver supports, estate paperwork, and advanced planning tasks such as doing Wills, Power of Attorney's, and Personal Directives, this can take multiple phone calls and meetings. In the months of March and April, 88 people with 169 distinct needs were assisted.

Employment supports decreased in April. 50 individuals viewed the job board, updated and created resumes, and received support faxing, emailing and completing online applications.

Income support numbers also decreased in April. Twenty individuals were assisted with calling AB Supports, photocopying and emailing documents to workers, and filing monthly reports to continue receiving benefits.

Many clients accessed the tax service as soon as it became available in March. Therefore client visits pertaining to the Community Volunteer Income Tax program decreased in April to 210 from the

Green View Family & Community Support Services 4707 – 50 Street, Box 1079 Valleyview, Alberta TOH 3N0 previously reported 420. 28 client visits in April were for assistance with Canada Revenue Agency, not related to filing 2021's Income Tax.

Coordinators have noted an increase of support being provided to individuals needing to complete their Metis applications. 5 clients were assisted with this process. There have also been individuals seeking assistance with passports applications, and information about Service Canada and passport photos.

The CRC Coordinator completed the Annual Report to Alberta Works in April, and will be participating in two upcoming trainings- Workplace Harassment and Violence Prevention and ESS Basics in May.

The Support Coordinator is scheduled to attend Defensive driving in May, and will complete the ESS Basics course in May.

May Programming

St. Stephens School

- I Can Handle Anger a 6-week program where grade 2 students will learn how to handle their anger in a socially acceptable way and how to deal with difficult emotions.
