LAST MONTH'S ACTIVITIES:

The two Community Resource Centers combined are averaging approximately 125 client inquires per week. The top reasons are for technical assistance, employment, income support and food bank information.

The Valleyview Food Bank asked for assistance with photocopying 50-60 applications, and this was done as per their request. The Food Bank volunteers will be supplying these to all active clients at the next Food Bank in December, with the request to complete these in full, with all required documentation attached. It will be stressed to clients that these need to be completed before the next Food Bank to receive assistance.

In Grande Cache, some repair contractors were laid off, supposedly because of lack of budget for repairs. The Community Resource Centre Coordinator fielded conversations last week with individuals feeling a lack of job security. Having helped individuals in the past during mine layoffs, the Community Resource Centre will be mindful of this additional pressure people are facing when fielding calls for assistance. It is unknown at this time how extensive layoffs will be or information about the stability of employment at the mine.

Administration in partnership the HEART (health, education, and action in relationships team), and ACWS (Alberta Council of Women's Shelters) organized "A Night to Lead Change in Valleyview "on November 9 at the Burnside Performing Arts building. This community presentation replaced the previous Breakfast with the Guys that was hosted in the past, and all genders were welcomed. There were over 140 community members in attendance, and the outcomes proved that over 89 percent of the attendees gained more knowledge on domestic violence. The feedback was very positive, and the event proved to start conversations and bring awareness to the issue.

The Youth Coordinator in Grande Cache is currently delivering programs in 3 out of the 4 schools in the Grande Cache area, Susa Creek, Grande Cache Community High School, and Summitview Middle School. The high school has the Girls Program (grade 9 and 10) and WiseGuyz (grade 9 and 10), and at the request of the middle school Gay Straight Alliance begins this Tuesday and will run for the duration of the school year. Susa Creek grade 4 students are taking part in the Body Talk program.

In Valleyview, current school programming includes Wizeguyz at Hillside High School, Mind Up and I Can Handle Anger at Oscar Adolphson Elementary.

There are currently 140 Home Support clients, 51 in the Grande Cache area, and 89 in the Valleyview, Debolt, and Grovedale areas.

The Outreach worker from Odyssey house continues to provide services out of our office in Valleyview, typically 2 times per month. Services include assisting those in a domestic violence relationship, and may

include counselling, safety planning, court accompaniment, and support groups for women. The next date for this service is December 14th.

At the December Interagency meeting, a new Assertive Outreach Services (AOS) social worker in the Town of Valleyview who works for Alberta Health Services explained her role. The AOS program serves those living with chronic and persistent mental health diagnoses, mainly focusing on schizophrenia, bipolar and those experiencing psychosis disorders. Her role includes supporting clients experiencing addiction and mental illnesses and creating and evaluating individualized goal-focused service plans to provide complex clients with short and long-term support.

The 2021-2023 Green View FCSS business plan has been included in this report. All updates have been included, and administration is recommending all current programs and services continue to be offered, with a few minor exceptions. I look forward to input from the Board in developing a business plan that will guide services for the nest three years.

The 2024 Program guides have been ordered and should arrive to distribute early in the new year.

All Coordinator updates are included in this report.

HIGHLIGHTS:

The CRC Coordinator was able to assist one of our regular clients who had lost their AISH (assured income for the severely handicapped) benefits due to an incarceration months ago, to re-establish his benefits without having to start from the beginning in the application process. This individual had been without benefits for months. With an email to his worker, the coordinator was able to explain the situation and work with them and the client to provide minimal updated information to re-establish the benefits. The worker provided an update last week, stating that the client would receive a generous direct deposit of what was back owed to him, and his benefits were fully restored. The client was extremely grateful and thanked FCSS for all the support and assistance provided over the years.

UPCOMING:

The youth mental health coordinator from the Resource Centre for Suicide Prevention will be hosting a program called the Phoenix Group at Green View FCSS on January 31. This one-day workshop is for youth grades 4-6 and focuses on topics such as thoughts, feelings, stress, and self-companion.

Mental health walk-in services continue at Green View FCSS on a monthly basis. The next session is scheduled for December 19, and services will resume monthly in the new year.

The January Interagency meeting will be held at the Valleyview location on January 9th. The purpose of these meetings is to share resources, provide updates on programs and services, and provide networking opportunities to ensure non-duplication of services and referral options to best serve community members.

A combined total of 384 residents received assistance through the Community Resource Centre in October and November. Assistance provided was mostly via phones call and email (70%) followed by in person assistance (30%). Forms assistance (Assured Income for the Severely Handicapped, Alberta Supports applications, etc.), Commissioner for Oaths, referrals and community information were the main reasons for connecting with the Community Resource Centre. Services were provided to residents of the Hamlet of Grande Cache (81%), residents of a Cooperative or Enterprise (15%) and individuals from other communities (4%).

The Purple Light Nights campaign wrapped up at the end of November. The campaign provided purple light bulbs to businesses, agencies, and individuals. Light bulbs were shining throughout the community mainly at night, however some remained light during daylight hours. Accompanying the light bulbs were social media posts that raised awareness about domestic violence. The social media posts reached just under 1000 people. Initially we anticipated 20 to 30 bulbs to be requested, administration is pleased to report that a total of 80 bulbs were given out. At the time of this report follow up phone calls are being made to gather feedback on the campaign. The feedback will be shared in the next Board report.

As mentioned in the last report, Death Café launched in November. Individuals had opportunity to attend on Monday nights to have conversations about death. The sessions are not counselling or support group, but a place to explore curiosities about dying and what comes after. Five people attended and shared personal and spiritual beliefs, learning from one another. While attendance was low, the gratitude expressed by participants will see the return of the Death Café in 2024. Dates and times are yet to be determined but will occur in the early part of the new year.

Also, on November 4 youth from the WiseGuyz program travelled with administration to Valleyview to attend A Night to Lead Change. These youth are referred to as the Returners because they attended WiseGuyz in the previous school year. This opportunity compliments the goal of deeper learner for the youth as we move forward with teachings about mentorship, leadership, allyship and advocacy to reduce relationship violence. When asked each youth stated that the evening let them see the wide-reaching impact relationship violence has and how many adults are ready to be apart of the solution.

Work with youth in schools has seen requests for programs that educate on healthy relationships, sexual health, emotional regulation, and friendships. Programs delivered are Miyo Wichihitowin, Girls Circle, Gay Straight Alliance, Kids Have Stress Too, Body Talk, WiseGuyz, and additional work with male youth that have returned to the WiseGuyz program. Of these programs one was completed (Miyo Wichihitowin) and outcomes can be found the Youth Coordinator section of this report. All other programs mentioned are

ongoing and as such do not have outcomes reported yet. Currently programming is taking place at Summitview Middle School, Grande Cache Community High School, and Susa Creek school.

The Outreach Coordinator services of transportation for essential needs and medication delivery are still being accessed with a monthly average of 20 trips. This service is most commonly utilized by residents of Muskeg and Susa Creek. The clients accessing the service face transportation barriers and this service is allowing them to maintain a sense of independence as they age and to age in place.

Beyond the work involved in coordinating Home Support clients the Adult Coordinator can be found supporting a variety of residents through supportive listening. The clients express feelings of being overwhelmed or defeated because they do not know how to improve their current situation. Once they share their story direct assistance is provided or appropriate referrals are made. The clients leave feeling relieved with resources in hand. This is a critical service provide in a rural community where connection to help often is through centralized out of town agencies or online.

Wrapping up 2023 staff are completing Program Summary Reports for all programs and services.

The Community Activity Fee Funding Program (CAFFP) currently has 51 clients. The Fitness Coordinator from the Grande Cache Recreation Centre spoke with the Community Resource Centre (CRC) Coordinator, reaching out to let them know that a new Community Activity Fee Funding Program client, had been actively participating in the gym. The Fitness Coordinator stated the client, who lives with addictions and mental health concerns, seemed to be doing very well, and seemed to be overall happier. In just a short time, the Fitness Coordinator has noticed the benefits of the Community Activity Fee Funding Program.

Another client, a single father, using the CAFFP came into the CRC to renew a 10x family pass. This client shared that having the passes has been beneficial in helping to strengthen the bond between him and their children.

Workplace Hazardous Materials Information Sheet (WHMIS) was completed.

HIGHLIGHTS:

Over the past several months, the CRC Coordinator has assisted a client, who is new to Canada, to prepare the paperwork for his wife and child with disabilities to immigrate. While he already had his Alberta Health Care Insurance Plan set up, he wanted to ensure that his daughter, who is in need of continuing medical care, and his wife were able to adapt to life in Grande Cache with as little disruption to daily life as possible. In addition to assisting with these forms, the family members were referred to Family Supports for Children with Disabilities, Grande Cache Community Learning and Employment Resource Centre, and Service Canada. The client and his family have expressed to the Community Resource Centre Coordinator that they are grateful for the help provided and "You will always be my friend now."

LAST MONTH'S ACTIVITIES:

Currently there are 55 clients in the Home Support programs, this includes 2 more clients and one client's death. There are 35 clients in the Hamlet, 18 reside in a Cooperative or Enterprise. 80% of clients are over the age of 65, 7% are families, and 13% are individuals currently on Assured Income for the Severely Handicapped. Two new clients have entered the Home Support Program in the Hamlet of Grande Cache.

October 11 the Adult Coordinator was invited to present at the Learn at Lunch at the Big Horn Golden Age Club. It was an information session on what Green View FCSS offers to the community and how the programs help promote and assist the aging populations. Home Care also had representation on how they assist the aging population. Acknowledging how each agency supports the clients eliminated confusion regarding services each agency provides and communicated how collaboration occurs between the programs. Two self-referrals to the Home Support Program resulted from the presentation.

Creative Grief and Loss continues to be delivered at the Tawow centre every Tuesday from 1-3pm. Six individuals are attending this program. This program will run to Dec. 12,2023 this year.

Surveys for developing a Single Parent Support Group were posted online and after tabulating the outcome from these surveys it was identified 60% of individuals acknowledge wanting more information on healthy relationships, communication and how to deal with loneliness.

After consultation with the Assistant Manager, the intent of developing a program solely for single parents has morphed into healthy relationships sessions. These sessions will invite people to understand where and how their values evolve and identifying those values, followed by exploration of how their values impact personal boundaries (financial, privacy, emotional, etc.) This will increase self awareness, which is a foundational component in healthy relationships. This program will have 6 sessions and run in the evening in a virtual format, which allow individuals throughout Greenview to attend. Dates and times will be shared early in the New Year.

HIGHLIGHTS:

A client who was grieving her husband and was new to our community. The client identified that she is living with depression and didn't have many friends. I talked with her for a while and suggested that she make a medical appointment and connect with Alberta Health Services Mental Health and Addictions. The client was also connected with other community services, like the Big Horn Golden Age Club to reduce the isolation the client has been experiencing.

LAST MONTH'S ACTIVITIES:

Girls Circle- In the month of November the Youth Coordinator with the BEST Worker continued to deliver the Girls Circle on every Monday in November from 11:15 till 12:20. The group has a constant 7 girls that come everyday and participate, it is a mix of grade 9 and 10 girls. The program is about helping build self-esteem, teamwork, and getting along with others.

WiseGuyz- 7 male youth are attending this program. The program has 2 more sessions before we finish modules 1 and move on to module 2. The Youth Coordinator attended the "Night to Lead Change" in Valleyview with the Assistant Manager, Outreach Coordinator, and the WiseGuyz Returners. The Night to Lead Change was held at the Burnside Theatre in Valleyview with presentations from the Alberta Council of Women's Shelters, domestic violence, consent, and leading change followed by a presentation from Karen Grosbee, correlation between addiction and domestic violence. FCSS staff did bring the WiseGuyz returners because of what the Night to Lead Change was covering fit in to what they are learning and was a great opportunity to get the hours for the Mentoring Credits.

Kids Have Stress Too- The Youth Coordinator delivered to K-3 in Susa Creek in the month of November, Kids Have Stress Too promotes resiliency by buffering the impacts of stress, students learn how to respond to stress in healthy and constructive ways. Once the Youth Coordinator completed the program with the K-3 split class the principal was so impressed that she requested the program for the grade 4-8 split class.

GSA- GSA is a peer led group that brings LGBTQ2S+ and allied youth together to build community and organize around issues impacting them in their school and communities. The Youth Coordinator had a meeting with the Summitview Middle School principal at which she was requested to facilitate a GSA afterschool once a week, it is offered every Tuesday and will run throughout the 2023/24 school year.

WiseGuyz Returners- The WiseGuyz Returners is a group that the Assistant Manager has created for the 5 boys that wanted to return to WiseGuyz. Coordinating with the high school Principal, the Assistant Manager was able to get create a mentoring group for the 5 boys to be apart off and to get 6 credits for participating. The A Night To Lead Change event in Valleyview is part of the hours which will contribute to credit achievement.

FCSSAA Conference- The Youth Coordinator attended her first FCSSAA Conference and was thrilled that she attended because of the sessions that was offered and experience and networking. The Youth Coordinator signed up for Indigenous teaching, Exploring the Man Code in our Communities, Sharing-Youth Supports and Ageism.

LAST MONTH'S ACTIVITIES:

The Outreach Coordinator attended the "Night to Lead Change" in Valleyview with the Assistant Manager, Youth Coordinator, and the WiseGuyz Returners. The Night to Lead Change was held at the Burnside Theatre in Valleyview with presentations from the Alberta Council of Women's Shelters, domestic violence, consent, and leading change followed by a presentation from Karen Grosbee, correlation between addiction and domestic violence. The Outreach Coordinator enjoyed this event and the follow up conversations had with the presenter from the Alberta Council of Women's Shelters. Overall, the Outreach Coordinator felt that the event had an impact on their role with the Green View FCSS office.

From November 22nd – November 24th the Outreach Coordinator attended the annual FCSSAA, Family and Community Support Services Association of Alberta, conference. Over the three days at the conference the Outreach Coordinator attended several sessions that will help them with their role within Green View FCSS. The sessions that the Outreach Coordinator attended were Indigenous Relationships and Engagement, Exploring the Man Code in our Communities, Alberta Supports 101, and Ageism – Documentaries and Discussions.

The Outreach Coordinator enjoyed each of the sessions that they attended for different reasons. They enjoyed the Indigenous Relationships and Engagement for the knowledge that the Elder had given about the reasonings behind smudging and land. Exploring the Man Code in our Communities was an excellent session for information sharing with different FCSS programs throughout the province, it was a good session for networking and program ideas. Alberta Supports 101 was an informative session for the different ways that Albertans can access the Alberta Supports program with the province, it will help the Outreach Coordinator assist their clients and the different needs that they require. Ageism – Documentaries and Discussions ended the session with an excellent documentary about a 97-year-old, who despite their age, had completed a marathon run, it was a great documentary about resiliency and over-coming obstacles when you are told that you are too old to do something.

There was an increase in the number of Wheels for Meals clients during the month of November, with 4 new clients.

The Outreach Coordinator attended a Coaching Call and Community of Practice with the Centre for Sexuality out of Calgary.

The Outreach Coordinator, with the Community Resource Centre Coordinator, hosted 3 Death Cafes at the Green View FCSS – Grande Cache office, over the 3 sessions there were 3 people in attendance, 1 returning for two sessions and 1 only coming to one. A Death Café is a group discussion of death with no agenda, objectives, or themes. It is a discussion group rather than a grief support or counselling session. The

conversations had at the Death Cafés where very rewarding with two different religious backgrounds coming to talk about what happens with the spirit after the person has passed, it was very educational especially with the religious backgrounds that the Outreach Coordinator was not versed in.

The Outreach Coordinator and Youth Coordinator started GSA at Summitview Middle School, at the time of reporting there has been only one session.

The Outreach Coordinator completed WHMIS training.

HIGHLIGHTS:

The Outreach Coordinator really enjoyed being able to connect with other FCSS programs at the FCSSAA conference and share Green View FCSS programs with others. It was nice to be in a place with like-minded people.

SEPTEMBER ACTIVITIES:

The Home Support program provides basic housekeeping, meal preparation, limited respite, and transportation to medical appointments or other essential services. The Home support team attended 492 client homes in October and November. Currently, there are 88 Home Support Clients, 58 from the MD and 30 in the town of Valleyview. During the last two months, 5 people signed on to the program and 2 people signed off. The Home Support team provided transportation 43 times during that time.

The Support and Referral program supports clientele by finding appropriate programs or assisting with applications and or advocacy. The Adult Coordinator assists people with caregiver support, entry into care facilities, estate paperwork, and advanced planning tasks such as doing Wills, Power of Attorney, and Personal Directives. These tasks can take multiple phone calls and meetings. The Adult Coordinator assisted 99 people with 158 needs in September.

Balance Restorative Yoga started on October 2nd. Balance is a strength and core-building yoga, it is designed to assist in fall prevention and injury or post-surgery recovery. It runs on Mondays and Fridays for a total of 12 sessions. 26 people attended. The fall session ended on Dec 4th. The Winter Session is scheduled to start on Jan 12, 2024.

On Oct 20th, Older Adult Day was held in Grovedale at the Community Hall. 18 people attended to learn about Pension and Benefits, Frauds and Scams, and to attend a Just in Case Workshop.

Older Adult Day was held in Valleyview on October 25th at the Seniors Drop-in Center. 22 people attended the day to learn about the Balance program, Pensions and Benefits, Scams and Frauds, and attend a Just in Case Workshop.

The Community Volunteer Income Tax Program (CVITP) utilizes volunteers to prepare income tax and benefit returns for people with modest incomes and simple tax situations. The program runs year-round, and community members can utilize the program throughout the year to get current and past returns completed. In October and November, the staff completed an additional 22 returns. Processes have started to get staff and volunteers vetted and ready for the new tax season. This requires up-to-date Criminal records checks and approval by the Canadian Revenue Agency.

LAST MONTH'S ACTIVITIES:

There was a total of 453 client visits to the Green View FCSS Community Resource Centre in the month of November 2023. Of the 453 client visits, 74 were residents of the Municipal District of Greenview, 132 were residents of Sturgeon Lake Cree Nation, and 247 were residents of the Town of Valleyview. Of the total clients, 9 were new and 444 were clients that had utilized the services at the Resource Centre previously.

68 clients came to the Community Resource Center for employment assistance. Clients received assistance with creating new resumes and cover letters, updating existing resumes and copies of safety certifications, photocopying employment related documents, emailing and faxing to employers. Clients utilized the coordinators assistance to locate and sign up for courses such as SellSafe Cannabis training through AGLC and Alberta Basic Security Training. Clients also utilized the computer in a quiet office space to complete courses.

51 client visits were regarding Income Support. Clients called and visited the Resource Centre for assistance with filing for benefits as well as completing monthly reporting, and document submission to their workers by email. Coordinators also worked with supervisors and other staff at Alberta Supports to arrange community intakes for clients that did not have ongoing access to phone or email. The Community Resource Centre phone number and location can be used for clients to connect with workers to begin the Income Support process. With consent from the clients allowing Green View FCSS Coordinators to communicate with workers at AB Supports, coordinators can support clients by relaying messages between the client and the worker to assist with appointment scheduling, document submission and other requirements during the process.

Clients called and visited the Community Resource Centre for many other needs in the month of November. Calls and visits were made for access to the Food Bank (33), Heart River Housing and housing information (14), Assured Income for the Severely Handicapped -AISH (23) referrals to Mental Health services (5), faxes and information given about Senior Special Needs and Alberta Senior Benefit (13), Canada Revenue Agency inquiries (19), Service Canada- primarily for Employment Insurance and bi-weekly reporting (16), Canada Pension Plan/ CPP Disability applications (9), Old Age Security and Guaranteed Income Supplement application (9), and legal "in nature" supports and referrals (32).

Many individuals were assisted with technological assistance. In November there were 98 visits for tech support. This includes many things including faxes, photocopies, accessing documents off clients' personal devices. Assistance was given to clients completing online documents and submitting documents for various reasons, and accessing My AHS Connect account through their Alberta.ca accounts.

HIGHLIGHTS:

In October there were 69 visits for employment supports and 68 visits in November. There was an increase in income support requests at the Community Resource Centre from 35 in October to 51 in November.

Surveys continue to be handed out to clients attending the Community Resource Centre as part of the Alberta Works Contract. In October and November, 100% of the clients surveyed were satisfied and pleased with the services provided. Some of the comments from the participants included "Friendly and ready and willing to help. Accomplished what I needed", "Great help!", and "They are always very friendly and helpful every time I come in."

In October and November, the CRC Coordinator participated in a Grief and Resiliency course through PACE and Northwestern Polytechnic, a webinar on Understanding Electricity and Natural Gas Utilities by the Utilities Consumer Advocate (UCA), a domestic violence training called "Strangulation: What Everyone Needs to Know", eCompliance- Back to Basics, and a webinar by David Irvine called "Mastering Accountability- Why We're Still Missing the Boat".

The CRC Coordinator will be preparing three Welcome Baskets for new residents to Valleyview. These families have relocated from Edmonton Alberta, British Columbia, and Ontario and all have relocated for new employment opportunities.

LAST MONTH:

As of November 30, 2023 the Support Coordinator is entering the date of service, the quantity of hours of service and the rate that will be charged to clients for Home Support invoicing.

On November 9th the Support Coordinator attended and participated in "A Night to Lead Change". The event focused on issues surrounding domestic violence and abuse. The evening brought community unity and supported individual intervention, small or large, as a positive way to build and foster a healthier community.

The Support Coordinator attended and completed the fire extinguisher course which educates staff to prevent fires and respond appropriately in case of a fire or related emergency.

From November 21st to November 24th the Support Coordinator attended the conference "Creating Connections, Building Bridges". The breakout sessions attended were FCSS 101, Exploring the Man Code in our Communities, Alberta Supports 101, and Ageism. Relationships were created during the sessions that promoted connections between participants over common issues. This networking will help staff support and improve the well-being of those in the community.

Assistance was given with employment resources, income supports, referrals, mental health and various other community services that are accounted for on the Community Resource Centre Coordinator's report. 8 requests for commissioning were completed by the Support Coordinator as reflected in the previously mentioned report under legal assistance.

HIGHLIGHTS:

A highlight for the Support Coordinator was networking and collaborating with Family and Community Support Service members including Grande Cache employees, Board Members, and other individuals that attended the conference.

LAST MONTH'S ACTIVITIES:

St. Stephens Catholic School and Oscar Adolphson Primary School participated in Mind Up and I Can Handle Anger in October and November. Programming at St. Stephens was completed in November while programming at Oscar Adolphson will continue until December.

Grade 3 students participated in Mind Up. This program uses mindfulness to teach emotional self-regulation and brain-focused strategies to help youth become focused and resilient.

Grade 2 students participated in I Can Handle Anger, an age-appropriate anger management program where students learn ways to handle anger and difficult emotions.

WiseGuyz began on October 18 with ten registered youths. WiseGuyz promotes mental health, and healthy relationships, and helps prevent adolescent dating violence. The Youth Coordinator facilitates WiseGuyz at Hillside Jr/Sr High School on Wednesdays from 11:00 am to 12:19, 10 male youths attended this program since starting on October 18. The program has started Module 2 which covers Sexual Health: human sexuality, anatomy and puberty, sexually transmitted infections and safer sex, pregnancy and pregnancy prevention, and Consent.

The Gay Straight Alliance (GSA) is a youth-led program that allows 2+LGBTQ, two-spirited, lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, and questioning youth a safe place to meet and form new friendships with likeminded youth. This program runs every Wednesday from 3:30-5:30 at the Valleyview Public Library. Currently, GSA has four regular attendees and two new participants.

A Sparks Fly Stationary Bike was purchased for Penson School in Grovedale after they contacted the Youth Coordinator asking for a replacement bike. Sparks Fly Bikes was a program initiated in 2015 to accompany the Mind Up Program. It provides stationary bikes in classrooms to support active learning.

The Youth Coordinator hosted a Cyber Safety Parent Workshop on the evening of October 24. Although attendance was low feedback from participants was positive.

The Youth Coordinator in partnership with the Valleyview Municipal Library hosted a Death Café on November 21. Death Cafes are group-directed discussions of death with no agenda, objectives, or themes. It is a discussion group rather than grief support or counseling. The evening was enjoyed by those who attended and requested that we meet every few months.

The Youth Coordinator took part in two online PACE workshops in October. Cross Cultural Awareness, education on cultural differences, improving awareness, understanding, and skills needed to deliver services and programs in a multicultural environment.

Awareness of Self-Harming Behaviour provided information on self-harming behaviours and the warning signs of individuals who self-harm. Topics such as why some people self-harm, possible triggers, assessing the person's motivation to stop self-harming, and strategies to help individuals stop self-harming were all addressed during the workshop.

VISION

MISSION

Family and Community Support Services is a joint partnership between the Province of Alberta, the MD of Greenview and the Town of Valleyview, that develops locally driven preventative social initiatives to enhance the wellbeing of individuals, families and communities.

We do this through:

- Providing preventative programs for all age groups
- Helping individuals develop independence, coping skills and become more resistant to crisis
- Building interpersonal and group skills
- Providing support that helps sustain individuals as active participants in their communities
- Increasing the community's ability to overcome difficulty and change

VALUES

Green View Family and Community Support Services supports the following beliefs:

- A community's most valuable resources are its people. Investments made in developing and supporting people pay dividends in all areas of community life.
- We can make valuable contributions to our communities and communities need the contributions of all of us.

GREEN VIEW FCSS PROFILE

History:

The Green View FCSS Board held their first meeting on April 16, 1997. Since that time the programs, services, number of staff and people served have significantly increased. The department moved into its current location in July 2012.

Access:

Green View FCSS is open Monday to Friday from 8:00-4:30 P.M. The office is closed for lunch from 12:00-1:00, and on statutory holidays.

Governance:

Green View FCSS is governed by a board consisting of:

- 1 member of Council from the Town of Valleyview
- 2 members of Council from the M.D. of Greenview
- 4 Community Members at Large

Human Resources:

Green View FCSS has staff year-round with 10 full time staff members and 12 permanent part time staff. Volunteers also play a role in various programs.

The Green View FCSS Manager (Director) is Lisa Hannaford, who continues to make everyone feel welcome at FCSS.

Clientele / Community:

The programs and services are offered to all of the Town of Valleyview residents and those residing in the MD of Greenview which include DeBolt; Little Smoky; New Fish Creek; Sunset House; Crooked Creek; Grovedale and Grande Cache and area. The total population served is approximately 11,400.00.

Partnerships:

 FCSS is a unique 80/20 funding partnership between the Government of Alberta and participating municipalities or Métis settlements. Provincially, the FCSS Program receives its mandate from the FCSS Act and Regulation. The Act describes what the Province and municipality/Metis Settlement can do to provide preventive social services. The Regulation describes how services may be provided.

The Regulation sets out the service requirements that a municipality or Métis Settlement must meet to be eligible for funding. At the local level, a municipality or Métis Settlement Council chooses whether to establish a Program and enters into an agreement with the Province to jointly fund FCSS activities. Under FCSS, communities design and deliver social programs that are preventive in nature to promote and enhance well-being among individuals, families, and communities. The programs depend on community resources, and where appropriate involve volunteers in delivery.

The FCSS philosophy is based on a belief that self-help contributes to a sense of integrity, self-worth, and independence. The programs developed are intended to help individuals within their communities to adopt healthy lifestyles, thereby improving the quality of life and building the capacity to prevent and/or deal with crisis situations should they arise.

PROGRAMMING

Green View FCSS offers programs and services to people of all ages. We manage the following programs:

- **Babysitting Courses**: Green View FCSS partners with service providers who deliver a one-day babysitting course, approx. three times per year for children 11 and older.
- Balance: a restorative yoga program for seniors, people with disabilities/disease and post-surgery recovery. This program increases strength and flexibility for fall prevention.
- **Body Talk:** For students in Grade 5 & 6-participants learn how to communicate effectively within boundaries and sustain healthy relationships. This program addresses anatomy, puberty, hygiene, and menstruation.
- Career and Employment Resource Services: Available at the Valleyview location.
 Residents can access the local job board, career and employment computers for job
 searching and resume building, internet access for printing government forms and
 completion of online employment insurance applications.
- Caregiver Workshops-A variety of workshops give caregivers the tools to manage
 the unique demands and challenges they face in the care giving role. This can be
 done individually or in a group setting.
- Commissioner for Oaths: Services provided free of charge.
- Community Activity Fee Funding (formally: Aboriginal Community Activity Fee Assistance Program): available to residents from the Cooperatives and Enterprises in the Grande Cache area. For those in addictions recovery, healing after a traumatic experience, or experiencing physical or mental health challenges this program provides access to programs and services available at the Grande Cache Recreation Centre. As of January 1, 2023, the program includes non-indigenous peoples and residents within the Hamlet of Grande Cache.
- Community Support Worker: Available to residents in Valleyview and area. Partners
 collaborate to provide an Outreach Worker from Odyssey House to support clients in
 the transition from situations of domestic violence to regain independence.
- **Counselling Services**: Green View FCSS offers short term one-on-one mental health appointments with a registered psychologist or professional therapist.
- Disconnect Boxes: Families or groups can use these boxes to temporarily store technological devices decreasing online time and increasing their in-person face to face connection.

- Eating for Your Well-being: This program provides clients with a 30-day cooking resource with easy-to-read recipes, weekly shopping lists, budget friendly ingredients and daily menus.
- **Emergency Social Services**: In times of a disaster, Green View FCSS provides services such as food; housing; childcare; pet care; personal services.
- The Empathy Program: This program uses stories and connections to build empathy in children aged 3-5.
- FCSS Baby Book Bags: FCSS and the Health Unit partner on this project which has been created to encourage and increase the practice of reading to young children.
 FCSS provides an educational package for new families to promote bonding and interaction with parents and the child.
- Friendship Groups: these small group settings are requested by teachers or school Principles to address and support conflicts, issues, or co-operation strategies in the schools.
- Gay/Straight Alliance: This participant led group provides a safe space for LGBTQ2+ youth aged 12-18 to gather, learn and support one another.
- Green View FCSS Grants: The FCSS Board is committed to supporting preventive social programs that positively impact the ratepayers of Greenview and the Town of Valleyview.
- Grief and Loss: Rainbows for school aged children; and Creative Grief and Loss for Adults. A certified facilitator works with clients during their grief journey providing insights and tools to assist in healing.
- Hands are Not for Hitting: For kindergarten and grade 1 students. Students will learn how to properly use their bodies when they are experiencing difficult emotions.
- HEART: Health, Education, and Action in Relationships Team. Stakeholders include the RCMP, Victims Assistance for Valleyview and Sturgeon Lake Cree Nation, Child and Family Services and Green View FCSS.
- Home Alone: a one-day program that is offered to all grade 4 classes in the MD. This
 program focuses on safety in the home and prepares children to be left alone for short
 periods of time.
- Home Support: This program provides light housekeeping, meal preparation, and transportation to access essential needs for adults experiencing disruptions to their normal household routines. Adults with disruptions due to physical limitations, mental well-being, pre/post operative care or pre/post-natal care may qualify for assistance. Currently 100 individuals throughout the M.D. access the program with up to 12 Home Support Workers providing service.

- I Can Handle Anger: 6-week program for students in grade one and two. This is an age-appropriate anger management program where students learn different ways to handle anger and other difficult emotions.
- Information, Referral, and Forms Assistance: We provide referrals that match your need and will assist with completion of forms or applications such as Assured Income for the Severely Handicapped (AISH), Income Support and Seniors Benefits.
- Inter-Agency Meetings: Green View FCSS hosts interagency meetings in Valleyview (first Tuesday of every month) and in Grande Cache (last Tuesday of every month). Attendees include organizations such as Alberta Health Services, Education, Mental Health, Victims Assistance, Adult learning, RCMP and Children's Services etc.
- **Just In Case Workshop**: This is a hands on workshop to start preparing the documents and information you will need when you or a family member has a sudden death or emergency.
- Kids Conference: Hosted in Grande Cache for children and youth aged 5-12. A
 dynamic 2.5-day conference offers participants session choices from three streams of
 learning: life skills, creativity, and physical well-being.
- Life Skills: For children and youth. Beyond the academic world children require skills
 that are used in daily life as adults. Areas of learning may include financial literacy,
 cooking, public speaking, fostering creativity, and navigating social dynamics.
- Meadows to Mountains Homelessness Prevention Project: This project provides crucial supports for individuals and families within Greenview to prevent homelessness. Clients are provided on-going support to navigate systems, access life skills development, and are shown how they are pivotal to their success in stabilizing their living situation. The project is funded through a partnership between Green View FCSS and the Alberta Rural Development Network.
- Mind-Up: a program that uses mindfulness to teach emotional self-regulation in students.
- Miyo Wichihitowin (Good Relations) -available in Grande Cache for children and youth aged 5-18. Students learn about local Indigenous culture, traditional practices, and have opportunities to connect with Elders and local Indigenous role models. Activities are open to all youth to bridge the gap between cultures.
- Mother –Daughter Circle: The purpose of this program is to promote a healthy sustainable bond between mothers and daughters aged 11-14 during the transitional years from girlhood to young womanhood

- Older Adult Information Day: This annual event focuses on programs and services available to the senior and older adult population. Event specifics vary as to need and interest, and a variety of guest speakers provide presentations.
- **Relationship and Sexual Education:** The Centre for Sexuality's RSE program provides curriculum for grade 4 10 students that was created in partnership with the Public Health Agency of Canada. Youth learn about sexual and reproductive health, healthy and respectful relationships, and violence and consent skills.
- School Presentations: Funding may be provided to schools within Greenview to host guest speakers. Topics may include themes such as bullying; digital citizenship; racism etc.
- **Seniors Supports**: Individuals are provided support in filling out forms, gaining access to federal and provincial supports, advocacy etc.
- **Volunteer Appreciation:** Green View FCS organizes events to recognize volunteerism in the community.
- Volunteer Income Tax Program: Volunteers provide this free service to seniors and low-income individuals.
- Welcome Baskets: The intent of this program is to ensure all newcomers to the M.D. are aware of FCSS and other M.D programs, as well as other community services and businesses in the area.
- Wheels for Meals: Green View FCSS delivers meals to residents in the Hamlet of Grande Cache. This program is in partnership with local seniors' lodges, who prepares and coordinates meals, while FCSS staff carry out the delivery.
- Why Try: A ten-week program designed for students in grades 4-12. This program assists children who are frustrated, confused, or angry with life's pressures and challenges. The program stresses to youth that although making good decisions can be difficult, doing so results in more opportunity, freedom, and self-respect.
- WiseGuyz: A 22 week program for male identified youth ages 13 21 that aims at prevention of adolescent dating violence and promote healthy relationships through education and awareness. Youth learn about healthy relationships, sexual health, gender, sexuality and the media and violence prevention and advocacy.


