

Greenview includes the Hamlets of Little Smoky, Ridgevalley, DeBolt, Landry Heights, Grande Cache and Grovedale. Our borders encompass the Sturgeon Lake Cree Nation and the towns of Fox Creek, and Valleyview, while Grande Prairie as our neighbour to the west. Serviced by Highways 40, 43 and 49, railways and a major airport in Grande Prairie, transportation is convenient and efficient.


Agriculture, forestry, oil and gas, coal and tourism are all mainstays of both the local and provincial economies.

Approximately one-quarter of the land within Greenview is suitable for agricultural development, with other natural resource

development primarily in the foothills and green areas in the south and west of Greenview.



The report provides a detailed overview of the projects undertaken in 2022. These include the development of an access road into the Greenview Industrial Gateway, investments in the Forestry Trunk Road, the successful launch of Engage Greenview (Greenview's Public Engagement Platform), and the revival of the Mountains to Meadow Quarterly Newsletter.

We are proud to highlight the 5th Annual Greenview Charity Clay Shoot, held at the Shot Shell Sporting Clay Range in Valleyview, AB. The event saw the participation of 102 sports shooters and received support from 36 corporate sponsors. Thanks to the collective efforts, the event raised nearly \$47,000.00, benefiting the five Food Banks serving the MD of Greenview.

Throughout the year, Greenview continued to foster collaboration and maintain strong relationships with municipal partners, industry stakeholders, and various levels of government. Recognizing the ever-changing environment within Greenview, the municipality remains committed to adapting its plans and remaining relevant. Council is dedicated to reviewing and updating the priorities outlined in the Strategic Plan, ensuring the best interests of Greenview are served as the community continues to grow.

2022 Council Summary



The following provides a summary of many 2022 Greenview projects:

Greenview's Strategic Plan 2022-2025

In late 2021, Greenview Council met to identify a strategic direction for our municipality and to set clear priorities to achieve over the next four years. The high-level plan will guide Council and Administration's activities for a shared vision for a better future. Council and Administration developed the strategic mission, vision, values, and priorities as a planning document to develop annual goals and plans based on priorities and budget.

Greenview Industrial Gateway (GIG)

In 2022, the Greenview Industrial Gateway development started with the initial clearing of land to facilitate the construction of a main road into the area, which is expected to be completed in 2023.

In April 2022, Cerilon signed an MOU to purchase approximately 200 acres in the GIG to construct a 2.8 billion dollar facility to manufacture ultra-low sulphur diesel and jet fuel.

Northwest Region Collaboration

This past October, municipal partners from the City of Grande Prairie and the County of Grande Prairie joined Greenview at an event in Calgary to highlight the unprecedented collaboration between municipal governments that have allowed our region to become a leader in traditional energy and emerging energy technology and innovation. The municipal partners will continue to build upon current projects to create long-term investment and employment in the region and for all Albertans.

Mountains to Meadows Newsletter

Greenview residents requested increased communication from Greenview, so in June 2022, the first edition of the Mountains to Meadows quarterly newsletter was launched. This newsletter aims to share relevant and valuable information with our residents to keep everyone informed. Our municipality is vast and diverse, and our Council members want to ensure our messages reach as many residents as possible to ensure effective community communications.

Engage Greenview

In 2022, Greenview launched Engage Greenview, a Public Engagement Platform. Engage Greenview is an opportunity for residents to contribute to decision-making by Greenview Council and Administration regarding Greenview policies, programs, projects and services. It allows residents to complete surveys and participate in discussion forums on various topics from the comfort of their homes.

Greenview Fire-Rescue Services Launched Green Light Pilot Program

On November 1, 2022, Greenview Fire-Rescue Services launched the Volunteer Firefighter Green Light program, which will aid in enhancing public safety and awareness by identifying Greenview Firefighters who are in the process of either mustering to the station for an emergency or responding directly to an emergency incident in their personal vehicle. The use of a flashing green light provides motorists and pedestrians with a visual notification that there is an emergency taking place and, as a courtesy, to yield if safe to do so.

Greenview Enforcement Services Launched Positive Ticket Program

Greenview's Enforcement Services Department launched a Positive Ticket Program to recognize youth who are positive influences in our communities. Tickets are issued for many positive "infractions" from young people caught doing great things, such as wearing a helmet while riding, properly putting away garbage, helping a community member, lending a hand to those in need, or other actions which bring positive changes to our communities.

Greenview Infrastructure Investment

Council's goal is to have well-built and well-maintained infrastructure that is sustainable, viable, and contributing to residents' quality of life.

In 2022, Greenview Council invested in significant projects like the TWP RD 701A Overlay Project, Grande Cache Water & Sewage Treatment Plant upgrades as well as the DeBolt Lift Station Forcemain upgrades, and the Valleyview Rural Waterline Extension.

5th Annual Greenview Charity Clay Shoot

Council held its 5th Annual Greenview Charity Clay Shoot on Thursday, September 9, 2022 at the Shot Shell Sporting Clay Range in Valleyview, AB., with 102 sports shooters registered along with the support of 36 corporate sponsors. This year's event raised \$46,802, with all proceeds going to the 5 Food Banks that serve the MD of Greenview.



Mozart Mission 3D Surgical System Gets Greenview Support

Council was proud to provide a \$25,000 grant to The Mozart Mission, which has partnered with the Grande Prairie Regional Hospital Foundation to raise \$275,000 to purchase the MOZART 3D System. The Mozart Mission is a team of individuals who have been personally affected by Breast Cancer. The MOZART System allows 3D imaging of cancerous breast tissue during surgery. It will identify clear cancer margins, thus reducing additional required surgeries. The MOZART System will provide patients with the comfort of knowing that all cancer was removed the first time.



STARS

Greenview supports STARS with an annual operating grant of \$210,000.00 commencing in 2021 calendar year and in addition, a five-year annual gift of \$100,000.00 for the STARS fleet renewal campaign to purchase a new helicopter H14.



DeBolt & District Agricultural Society

Greenview was proud to support the DeBolt & District Ag Society's Semi-Annual Harvester's Ball on November 5, 2022. Councillor Tom Burton and Councillor Jennifer Scott were pleased to be in attendance! 

Agricultural Services

Agricultural Services Department provides support to the Greenview and administers the Agricultural Service Board (ASB), bringing their decisions and concerns to Council, delivering ASB programming, and enforcing applicable legislation, on behalf of Greenview Council. The Agricultural Service Board Act empowers the Council appointed Board, and the Board is responsible for municipal adherence to the following legislation: Alberta Soil Conservation Act, Alberta Agricultural Pests Act, Alberta Weed Control Act and support and adherence to Alberta Animal Health Act.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Agricultural Services assisted 54 landowners to control their noxious weed infestations. This is the highest number of assisted landowners to date and is in thanks to a new skid-mounted spray apparatus making access to small infestations more efficient.
- 2022 saw the first year of the Greenview Shelterbelt Program. Administration coordinated between Grovedale, Grande Cache, DeBolt and Valleyview to ensure each area had a close location to pick up. Residents purchased and planted 6,605 seedlings.
- Extension and Outreach took centre stage for the department in 2022. 9 workshops were held with 125 people attending. The department is excited for the events they have planned for 2023 and hope to see you all soon.

FACTS

- 485 fields surveyed for clubroot with 4 fields returning positive results. Since 2017, 42 positive cases have been detected, 14 are currently under notice, and 28 have been released from notice with no recurrence to date.
- Total Weed Inspections: 2,648
Total Controlled: 1,780 for a 67% control rate. These numbers provide a baseline for Council to gauge improvement in control rates of infestations throughout Greenview.
- 1,159.078 km of right of way was sprayed as part of the roadside vegetation program. This equates to 2,318.156 km being sprayed as each ditch is done separately, requiring the road be travelled twice.



Construction & Engineering


Construction & Engineering (C & E) works collaboratively with many departments to ensure the safety of the travelling public and our ratepayers. C & E also oversees the following: investigates new road requests; construction of new approaches, as well as relocations and upgrades as approved by the Planning & Development Department; purchases land required for drainage projects, bridge construction, and subdivisions; oversees contracts for bridge replacements, maintenance and annual inspections; arranges yearly road inspections; conducts traffic counts; manages asphalt overlay and projects that have been approved within the budget.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Completed approximately 5 km in asphalt overlay throughout Greenview which included Twp. 701A and Range Road 251 located near Grovedale.
- Final completion of a full regrade of Range Road 64 of approximately 3 km. This is a heavily used road with residential, industry/farm and recreation users. Located in the Grovedale area.
- Completed shoulder pull in the Sunset House area of approximately 24 kms.

FACTS

- In 2022 Greenview contracted:
 - 90 km of spray patch
 - 141.9 km of crack sealing
 - 580 km of line painting

Economic Development

The Economic Development & Tourism Department works on initiatives set out by Council that enhance the lives and daily experience of Greenview ratepayers and visitors. The department pursues growth opportunities that meet the strategic goals set out by Greenview Council such as; build business relationships; promote Greenview as an investment opportunity to industry at the provincial, national and international levels; deliver programming for small business and community not-for-profits; work with regional partners on strengthening municipal and community relationships; and work actively to educate and promote Greenview's tourism opportunities.

HIGHLIGHTS

- The Grande Prairie & District Chamber of Commerce, in partnership with the City of Grande Prairie, County of Grande Prairie and MD of Greenview were the successful recipients of Alberta Labour and Immigration Labour Market Partnership funding. This funding will support comprehensive research and the creation of an attraction and retention tool for employers that ultimately aims to build and sustain a talent pool by empowering the region to ensure new employees and their families feel welcomed in the community and ready to establish roots and stay.
- An Economic Development and Grande Cache Tourism Business Open House at the Grande Cache Tourism & Interpretive Centre on July 7, 2022, and was an opportunity for Business voices to be heard and to learn what types of support Greenview Businesses are in need of.

Enforcement Services

Greenview Community Peace Officers (CPO's) are responsible for enforcing community bylaws and the Provincial Statutes outlined on their individual appointments. This is accomplished through proactive patrols, educational measures and by responding to complaints. Community Peace Officers strive to improve the safety and quality of life of our residents by diligently observing bylaw and other Provincial Statute violations during the execution of their duty. Our Peace Officers are actively involved in partnerships with local schools, community groups, boards, and various other community-based organizations to achieve our goals and priorities.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Officers duties include patrolling roadways throughout Greenview, answering the concerns of the ratepayers, enforcing Municipal Bylaws, Provincial Statutes, and having a visible presence within Greenview.
- Officers patrol the jurisdictional boundary by conducting vehicle, UTV, snowmobile and foot patrols. Enforcement Services believes education is a very crucial part to obtaining voluntary compliance and therefore our Community Peace Officers participate in various community and educational events.
- Greenview Community Peace Officers liaise with the other Municipal Departments, the RCMP, and other Peace Officer agencies to ensure that the services being provided to residents are some of the best in the Province.

FACTS

- In 2022, Enforcement Services Officers logged 1470 calls for service and issued 2521 Violation Notices Tickets.
- Greenview Enforcement Services serves a population of approximately 8,584 and an approximate land area of 33,000 sq km.
- There are 3 primary offices from where Enforcement Services are operated within Greenview. The main office is the Hamlet of Grande Cache, which employs the manager and one additional Community Peace Officer. There were two Community Peace Officer employed in Grovedale, and one Community Peace Officer employed in DeBolt.

The Environmental Services Department manages the capital construction and daily operations of the water, wastewater, and solid waste infrastructure systems within Greenview. Due to Greenview's size and varied population density, and services vary according to location. The mandate of the Environmental Services department is to provide high quality water, wastewater and solid waste systems that meet all Provincial and Federal Standards for the residents of Greenview. Greenview is committed to the responsible management of waste, and we remain dedicated to continuously improving our operations to ensure the best possible outcomes for the environment and the community.






HIGHLIGHTS

- Greenview began operating the new Grovedale Water Plant and Distribution Systems for Grovedale and Landry Heights in July 2022. These systems provide potable water for residents, as well as fire protection for the communities and encourage stable growth for the area.
- Greenview installed a new sewage force main system in the Hamlets of DeBolt and Creeks Crossing, demonstrating a commitment to sustainable growth and to ensure that the Hamlets' sewage needs are met both now and in the future.
- Greenview installed additional groundwater monitoring wells at the Grande Cache Landfill, which will enable Greenview to closely monitor the landfill's impact on the surrounding environment and make informed decisions on future measures aimed at mitigating any potential impacts.

FACTS

- Did you know Greenview owns and maintains 229 hydrants?
- Greenview has become a partner in the West Yellowhead Regional Waste Management Authority (WYRWMA) located in Hinton in order to facilitate the transportation of municipal solid waste from Grande Cache to the West Yellowhead Landfill. This is being done in anticipation of the closure of the Grande Cache Landfill, which will subsequently be converted into a transfer station. This partnership secures a long-term solution for solid waste disposal for the Hamlet of Grande Cache. Greenview recognizes the importance of responsible waste management practices and is committed to ensuring a smooth and efficient transition for the residents of Grande Cache.

Facility Maintenance

The Facility Maintenance Department is responsible for the upkeep, cleanliness, safety, and security of 19 major buildings and another 39 smaller facilities spread throughout Greenview. To effectively maintain these buildings, Facility Maintenance is divided into shops in Valleyview, Grovedale and Grande Cache.

We are also an integral part in all events held by Greenview as the team is responsible for the set up and take down of the venues. In 2022 we have been focused on improving asset reliability in all buildings and capital improvements.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Increased the size of the DeBolt Public Service Building to provide a dedicated bay for Operation. There is a strategic advantage having Operations based out of DeBolt, now they have a place to maintain and store their equipment.
- Continually developing our preventive maintenance program for facilities, along with required annual checks we have started a bi-monthly building inspections which focus on all building systems and detect problems before they can become major.
- Due to the age of the building a large section of the roof at the Sunset House Community Hall was being compromised. This year we have worked to replace the old section of the roof with a new torch down roof system.

FACTS

- Every year in preparation for winter, Facility Maintenance completes a thorough preventive maintenance inspection of all their building heating systems. The inspections of the over 270 heaters take 2 months to complete but have significantly increased uptime on the heaters through the winter. This has proven so beneficial that we have now began a similar program in the spring for air conditioner units.
- Looking after all aspects of grounds maintenance surrounding our buildings requires a significant effort. Along with mowing over 40 acres of grass, our Beautification Team maintains all flower beds and baskets, conducts a thorough spring clean up and manages the health of all trees.



Fire Rescue Services

In 2022, Greenview Fire Rescue Services (GFRS) and our contracted partners again delivered excellent emergency response to the Greenview community. This included responses to fires, motor vehicle collisions, medical co-response with Alberta Emergency Medical Services, and at times specialized responses, such as back country and water rescue. All firefighters within the GFRS are volunteers, your neighbours, spending their time away from their families and work obligations to train, participate in community outreach activities and when an emergency occurs at all hours, respond to protect those who are at risk. During 2022, all firefighters that had retired from active service were presented with a well-deserved Certificate of Commendation and an accompanying gift in recognition of their exemplary service to the community. Call volumes again increased with medical co-responses and motor vehicle collisions responsible for the bulk of the emergency responses.

HIGHLIGHTS


- **Greenview Fire Rescue Services (GFRS) Launches Green Light Pilot Program.** Greenview Fire Rescues Services launched a Volunteer Firefighter Green Light program to enhance public safety and awareness by identifying Greenview Firefighters who are in the process of either mustering to the station for an emergency or responding directly to an emergency incident in their personal vehicle. The use of a flashing green light will provide motorists and pedestrians with a visual notification that there is an emergency taking place and, as a courtesy, to yield if safe to do so.
- **Largest Industrial Fire in Grande Cache History.** Grande Cache experienced its biggest industrial fire to date, which required a remarkable joint effort involving personnel from all three stations in three key phases: response and on-scene fire operations, the provision of additional fire-fighting resources, and the fire investigation.



Green View FCSS

Green View Family and Community Support Services (FCSS) is a municipal/provincial program that provides locally driven, preventive, social initiatives. Green View FCSS is two words, representing the joint partnership between Greenview and the Town of Valleyview. This program employs over 20 staff members and has a 7 member advisory board.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Last year Green View FCSS formed partnerships with the Calgary Centre for Sexuality and the Canadian Public Health Association to deliver relationship and sexual health education in schools. The curriculum and training for this evidence-based content is provided to FCSS facilitators by these organizations.
- Our Home Support service, accessed by over 130 residents, provides light housekeeping, meal preparation and transportation to essential services. This program aligns with the provincial priority of “aging in place” and allows seniors and other residents to remain in their own homes for as long as they are able.
- The Community Volunteer Income Tax Program is a poverty reduction strategy. In 2022, 849 taxes were filed at no cost to individuals with modest incomes. This brought \$3,912,644.00 back into the communities within the MD of Greenview.

FACTS

- In 2022, the combined users of the FCSS program totalled 12,115. This figure includes those who received direct assistance or educational programming from the department. Programs offered in schools vary depending on need, but may include emotional regulation, healthy youth development, critical thinking and healthy relationships.
- Services for adults included assistance with employment, accessing benefits and government subsidies, and a variety of other programs that empower people to act on issues or barriers affecting their lives. In 2022, staff fielded over 10,000 inquiries residents had about various provincial and federal programs, employment needs, forms assistance and other social service information.
- Certified Commissioners of Oaths are available in Valleyview and Grande Cache office locations. In 2022, 231 individuals utilized this service offered free of charge.



Grande Cache Recreation Centre

The Grande Cache Recreation Centre is home to an Aquatic Centre, which features a 25-meter pool, zero entry wave pool, lazy river, and a water slide, in addition to a dry and steam sauna; and also features an NHL size arena, 4 sheet curling rink, Fitness Centre, and 4 additional multi-purpose rooms. Our department oversees, coordinates, and maintains the facility, along with several parks, playgrounds, and campgrounds in collaboration and assistance from various Greenview departments. In addition, staff coordinate, plan, facilitate, and oversee various programs, lessons, and events within our facility, including After-school programs, swim lessons, and fitness classes. Our goal is to provide safe, affordable, reliable indoor & outdoor recreational opportunities for people aged birth to 90 plus, as well as memories that will last a lifetime.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Lighting of Rocky the Ram event. This event is one of our biggest events hosted by the Programs Department, along with other community partners. Approximately 350 people attended in 2022 (which was fantastic despite the cold weather)! 2023 will be the 15th year celebrating this event!
- Grande Cache Lake Summer Camp. In 2022, we provided a 3-day summer camp for ages 8-12 where we had private instructors lead and teach the youth about plants, making fires, carving wood and so much more.
- The Grande Cache Aquatics Team taught 325 swimmers in the Lifesaving Society Swim for Life Program and 335 swimmers in the School Swim Program, teaching school-age children basic swimming, water safety and safe rescue skills.

FACTS

- The following number of people attended our programs & events in 2022:
 - Annual Paint the Ice Event - 75 people
 - Jump into Summer Kick Off event held to provide summer community program information - 80 people
 - Annual Easter Egg Hunt Event - 149 people
 - The Griswold Family Christmas Tree Hunt - over 70 people with 25 trees going home for Christmas
 - The house decorating contest had 19 entries
 - 160 After School & Summer Programs were offered, with almost 1200 kids registered for these programs



Greenview Regional Multiplex

The Greenview Regional Multiplex (GRM) is an 82,042 square foot recreational facility in the heart of the MD of Greenview in Valleyview, serving approximately 7000 people in the region. A family friendly multi-use facility with an Aquatic Centre, Fitness Centre, Fieldhouse (one of the largest gymnasiums' in North West Alberta, that doubles as an Event Centre to host 885 people at a time); 136 metre, two lane Indoor Walking Track, Indoor Play Centre for ages 3-12, Dance Studios, Commercial Kitchen, Party Room, Boardrooms, and Concession. The GRM offers programs, events, specialized training, and a space for connecting with family and friends.

HIGHLIGHTS

- **Member of the Month Program** was launched in January. This program was created to recognize our members who are committed to making their health & fitness a priority & utilize the Greenview Regional Multiplex to do so.
- **Put a Family in the 'Plex! Sponsorship** launched in July. Thirteen (13) local businesses have provided FREE access to 14 families to utilize the Greenview Regional Multiplex for 3 months.
- **Super Senior Club Program** launched in December. A program created to promote FREE access for Seniors 70+ years. Recognizing their efforts to continue a healthy & active lifestyle. Super Seniors will have their names placed on the Super Senior Wall of Fame should they fulfill club guidelines.

FACTS

- The Greenview Regional Multiplex was awarded the "Best Place to Work" at the Best of Valleyview Chamber of Commerce Awards.
- Over 56,000 patrons visited the facility throughout 2022.
- Over 135 registered programs offered in the facility throughout 2022.

Operations

The Operations Department is responsible for road maintenance, repairs, and fleet services throughout Greenview. This includes fleet and mechanical services, snowplowing services, road grading and re-gravelling, dust control, road bans and bonds, road use agreements and permits, management of gravel pits and leases, traffic signs, crosswalks and sidewalks, roadside brushing and mowing, drainage, culvert replacements, repairs, and upgrades.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Two culverts were bored under Young's Point Road by Sturgeon Lake. The road was able to be kept open to local and recreational traffic travelling through the area during the project.
- The outflow culvert and ravine area adjacent to Labyrinth Park in the Hamlet of Grande Cache was repaired. The erosion area repaired was 125m long and up to 7m deep.
- A ditching project was completed south of Ridgevalley on TWP RD 710, West of RGE RD 265. 1 mile of ditch cleaning was completed, re-establishing the ditch, removing up to 1 metre of material.

Outdoor Recreation

The Outdoor Recreation Department is responsible for outdoor recreation sites located throughout Greenview. These recreation sites include seven campgrounds, five day use areas, two community walking trails and one group use area. During the past couple of years, programming has become a focus for the department, with new things being rolled out each year. Additionally, Outdoor Recreation works heavily with Alberta Forestry, Parks & Tourism on joint projects on public lands.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Little Smoky Riverbend Park, located adjacent to the Hamlet of Little Smoky officially opened to the public in 2022.
- A playground was installed at Johnson Park, which is located six kms south of the Town of Valleyview.
- Greenview took over the operation of Sheep Creek Provincial Recreation Area and Smoky River South Recreation Area.
- Outdoor survival camps were hosted at Johnson Park, Grovedale Fish Pond, and Grande Cache Lake. These were a huge success with waitlists for all locations.

Planning & Development

The Planning and Development Department provides assistance and information to facilitate planning and development within Greenview pursuant to Part 17 of the Municipal Government Act. Our wide range of services include the following: Approach Applications, Business Licensing, Development Permits, Land Use Amendments, Road Allowance Licensing, Road Closures, Addressing, Subdivisions, and policies, procedures and bylaws.

The department provides advisory assistance to ratepayers, developers, contractors, administration, Council and the Municipal Planning Commission to support the mandatory requirements established by the provincial government for current and long-range planning.

The audited financial statements of Greenview are comprised of the






OPERATING EXPENSES






TAX REQUISITIONS




LONG TERM DEBT USE & LIMITS



Every municipality in Alberta has a debt limit which is calculated based on the revenue of the municipality. When revenue increases, the capacity to borrow also increases. 
ACCUMULATED SURPLUS






